

PREFACE

Pazhassi Raja NSS College, Mattannur, named after the great patriot and illustrious freedom fighter and native King, Sri. Kerala Varma Pazhassi Raja, the martyr who sacrificed his life fighting the British in the year 1805, was established in 1964 as a Junior College offering Pre Degree Courses in various disciplines. It was established by the Nair Service Society, the organization that was founded by the visionary social reformer and eminent educationalist Padmabhooshan Sri. Mannathu Padmanabhan, which has since then made sterling contributions to the dissemination and promotion of education in Kerala. Ever since its inception the College has progressed through a number of milestones which includes the incorporation of Undergraduate Courses in the year 1967, Postgraduate Course in 1999, Research Centre in 2006 and the most important, the "B" Grade Accreditation by NAAC in 2010.

The college which is situated a mere one and a half kilometers away from Mattannur, a town which is the headquarters of the Municipality, has a sprawling campus of 16.5 acres, which was donated by the generous members of the local public. The green and eco-friendly ambience prevailing in the campus is highly conducive to academic activities and also for evolving a comprehensive campus life with a wide variety of undertakings. As explicitly pronounced in our mission statement the college has always attempted to cater to the needs and aspirations of higher education in a just and equitable manner and has been committed to the dissemination of critical knowledge and scientific wisdom. As of now, the college offers a wide variety of undergraduate courses, post graduate courses and research courses at our campus. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- Pazhassi Raja N.S.S.College, Mattanur is an aided college founded by the great social reformer Padmabhooshan Sri. Mannathu Padmanabhan and governed by the corporate management of Nair Service Society. The institution follows the curriculum and syllabus designed by Kannur University.
- Out of 43 permanent faculty members, 30 had been members of upper academic and administrative bodies of various Universities as Syndicate Member, Member of Faculty, Chairman of Board of Studies and Member of Board of Studies
- The institution offers 10 UG programmes, 2 PG programmes and 1 Ph.D. programme in Chemistry. Research laboratory of Department of Physics which produced 5 Ph.Ds till date has applied for recognition as Research Centre.
- In addition to the regular programmes, the institution has developed curriculum for 11 certificate programmes offered by different departments.
- Choice Based credit and Semester System introduced by the University in 2009-10 provide lateral mobility with the introduction of open courses.
- IQAC develops action plan for effective implementation of the curriculum every year based on feedback from students and parents.
- The institution adopts innovative ICT enabled teaching, learning and evaluation methods using NPTEL, Spoken Tutorial Programme by IIT Mumbai, virtual labs, simulations and online examinations for effective curriculum delivery and transaction.
- The institution networks with the beneficiaries like industry, research bodies and Universities through visits, collaborations and interactions.
- University curriculum is supplemented with both pedagogical innovations like WWS and SSP, two new initiatives of Govt. of Kerala and co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- In order to increase the demand in employment market, the institution offers various skill oriented programmes like ASAP of KSHEC and Coaching for Entry in Services by UGC.
- The institution takes efforts to integrate the major cross cutting issues like Gender Equality, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum through a number of activities organized by college student's union, NCC, NSS and various departmental clubs and forums supported by UGC, KSCSTE, CED, EMC, MoEF, local bodies, NGOs and PTA.
- To ensure holistic development of the students, the institution takes efforts to inculcate moral and ethical values in students and foster community orientation.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- The college follows the admission criteria laid by Kannur University and has a legitimate, transparent and well organized procedure. The admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate and reflect the national commitment to diversity and inclusion.
- 75% of the students in the college are girls and approximately 74% of the students belong to socially and economically weaker sections of the society.
- The college organizes orientation programme for the newly admitted students to acquaint them with the campus atmosphere, examination & evaluation processes, extra and co-curricular activities etc. The college conducts certificate courses and enrichment programmes to enable them to cope up with the programme of their choice
- The institution identifies and responds to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners by promoting them to appear for talent search examinations (APT-TSE), training programmes conducted by various institutes and organizations (PTTS, KSCSTE) and courses offered by NPTEL. WWS for advanced learners and SSP for slow learners are

being effectively implemented in the college. SSS scheme, a joint venture of teaching and non teaching staff is implemented to support financially and morally the underprivileged students.

- The institution follows student-centred teaching learning process effectively by adopting various teaching methods suited to the learning abilities of students like interactive learning using MOODLE, NPTEL, virtual lab etc., independent learning by accessing ejournals via N-LIST.
- The fully automated central library with Grandha Software, 31817 books, Journals, Magazines/Periodicals, News papers, e-journals, CDs, and N-LIST services augment the teaching learning processes.
- The college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc through various programmes organized by student's union, clubs and forums, NCC, NSS and Vanithavedi.
- The institution takes up initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered through Centre for Career Guidance, Counseling and Extension, developing entrepreneurship by joining Entrepreneurship Development Club and nourishing Research Aptitude by promoting research culture through the organization of seminars, workshops and colloquium.
- The Principal and the academic committee plan, monitor and evaluate the academic activities of the institution. The IQAC sets the quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic activities of the institution and monitors their effective implementation.
- Of the 43 permanent faculty members, 25 are PhD holders and 10 are doing research for PhD Degree. 6 faculty members are approved research guides of Kannur University. Two of the faculty members received awards / recognition at the State and National level for excellence in academics, literature and arts during the last five years.
- During the last five years, 17 faculty members attended refresher courses, 10 attended HRD programmes, 17 attended orientation programmes, 24 attended various seminars and workshops and 4 members attended staff training programmes conducted by University and other institutions.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- The institution has two research centres, Chemistry and Physics (recognition procedure is under progress) and 6 research guides. 6 PhD's have been produced during the last six years and currently 13 research scholars are currently pursuing their research.
- Research cell functioning in the college aims at inculcating research inventiveness among
 the faculty members and students of the college. The institution promotes interdisciplinary
 research and the optimal use of available research facilities. The administrative support
 and academic freedom encourages the faculty to focus on the local environmental and
 social issues. The multidisciplinary journal published by the research cell provides an
 opportunity for the teachers to publish their research articles.
- The faculty members have completed 15 Minor Research Projects and 1 Major Research Project during the last five years. Proposals for 6 Minor Research Projects have been submitted for funding.
- The faculty published 62 research papers in National Journals, 84 in International Journals, 6 Books, 32 Articles, and 33 Book Chapters.
- Our faculty Dr Sumitha Nair and Dr. Sumith P.V received awards/recognitions for excellence in academics, literature and arts.
- The institution organized 11 National Seminars, 2 National Conferences, 2 National Workshops, 62 Regional Seminars and 13 Regional Workshops during the past six years.
- Many researchers of eminence visited our campus during the past six years. These initiatives provided a platform to share their knowledge and expertise with the faculty and the students so as to inspire them to explore higher possibilities in education and research.

- Considering the significance of institute-industry interface in the present global economic scenario, efforts are made by the college to provide maximum exposure to the students through the activities of the Entrepreneurship Development Club of the college.
- Since the institution realizes its role in the development of the society, it promotes its extension of the services to the society through consultancy. This being a Government aided institution; the faculty members are encouraged to offer voluntary consultancy services.
- Besides formal MoUs with 4 institutions, collaborative arrangements are made for the conduct of seminars and workshops in terms of financial and man power support.
- The college is keen to impart value education and to train students to take up responsibilities that transform them into socially committed citizens. The Institution promotes the participation of students in extension and outreach activities through NCC, NSS, different Clubs and forums and college students' union.
- The activities of NSS units of the college were recognized with awards as given below:

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- The college has good infrastructural facilities which include adequate number of classrooms, laboratories, library, seminar halls, faculty rooms, girls' room, girls' friendly toilets, open air stage, play grounds, medicinal garden and hostels.
- The college library with more than 31,000 volumes and 65 journals is the prime learning resource of the institution. The library is automated with GRANDHA software, and author-wise and title-wise search is facilitated through OPAC. Subscription to N-LIST of INFLIBNET provides access to more than 6000 journals and 90,000 e-books.
- There are83 computer systems in the college. Computer lab and administrative office are having LAN with internet connectivity. There are sufficient numbers of UPSs for ensuring power back up. Generators are also installed to ensure uninterrupted power supply in the campus.
- 200 meters track, multi gymnasium, basketball court, volleyball court, kho-kho court and hand ball courts provide a good ambience for sports and games.
- The college has separate hostels for men and women.
- Other facilities on the campus include canteen, drinking water facilities, post office and a co-operative store.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- The various dimensions of student progression are addressed by the college at different levels through a dynamically interwoven system. The accountability of the institution to the society is expressed through committed activities of various organizations within the college.
- Prospectus and college calendar gives comprehensive details about the programmes and facilities available in the college. The college website acts as a medium of communication with the society.
- The college takes effort to provide financial support available in the form of various scholarships (governmental/intuitional /other agencies) to students. More than 75% of our students avail various types of grants and scholarships. In addition to this the college has a unique venture- the Student Support System- through which the needy students avail financial support.

- Vigilant and coordinated activities of the anti-ragging committee, anti-sexual harassment cell and grievance redressal cell instill a sense of security and confidence in the college community. Various committees such as the discipline committee, anti-ragging squad and women's cell join hands to ensure the safety of students in the campus.
- Focusing on development of entrepreneurial skills the ED club of the college with a motto 'Earn while you Learn' organizes diverse programmes. The certificate courses offered by various departments also help students to develop professional and entrepreneurial skills. Womens'cell and College central library also conducts activities to enhance entrepreneurial skill development in students.
- The Career Guidance Cell and the Coaching for Entry in Services Programme organize programmes to enhance the chances of employability of students. Free coaching classes, seminars, interactive sessions on personality/soft skill development and guidance services are provided to students.
- PG departments offer coaching programmes for students appearing for UGC-NET examination and an appreciable number of students have cleared NET-JRF examination.
- The multilevel system of monitoring and analysis of performance of students help to upgrade the achievement levels of students. Considerable number of students moves to higher levels of education and attainment. Students who are weak in their academic performances are supported by mentors/tutors and peers in their academic work.
- Democratic way of student leadership is ensured by the College Union which is elected through the Parliamentary mode of election.
- The collegeprovides ample opportunities to students to express their co-curricular and extra-curricular talents. The cultural activities of the college are coordinated by the arts forum ARANGU, and the sports activities are coordinated by Department of Physical education. Our students exhibit consistently meritorious performance in arts and sports.
- The active NSS and NCC units of college through their dedication, hardwork and extension of services to society have ensured accountability of the institution.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- The NSS is a corporate management taking lead role in promoting the aided sector in education and thereby supporting common people and their educational requirements. The management is playing a pivotal role in formulating the higher education policies of the state by direct and indirect interactions and involvement with political parties and governments.
- The NSS management has a well structured educational system and planning with a long term vision of enhancing the quality of the educational institutions.
- The management works with the support of IQAC, College Development Committee and College Council to form well defined policy statements and action plans. The periodic review meetings strengthen the process towards the fulfillment of the stated mission.
- Participative management is promoted at all levels. The delegation of authority and provision of operational autonomy are implemented by decentralizing the governance.
- A democratic system of electing the College Students' Union following the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendations prevails in the College, and ensures peaceful academic ambience in the college.
- The management ensures that all the members of the staff comprehend the Vision and Mission of the college. The transparency of policies and sharing of responsibilities always help to foster a sense of belonging among all. Under the great leadership of the management, The Principal, HODs and staff members (both teaching and non-teaching), share responsibilities at each level and the team work is quite instrumental in building up an excellent working atmosphere in the campus.
- The college has a cordial relationship with all stakeholders parents, alumni and the society. To reinforce the culture of excellence and to champion organizational change, the

- policy statements and action plans are formulated based on feedback from the stakeholders.
- The institution has an inbuilt mechanism to respond to suggestions, complaints and grievances of students. The college interacts with its stakeholders formally and informally and timely measures are taken to solve the problems if any.
- The college provides a conducive environment for the development of professional competencies of the teaching and non teaching staff.
- The IQAC is envisaged as an internal nodal agency to evaluate, promote and consolidate all the activities of the college.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

- Our plastic free and eco friendly, green campus is situated on the edge of a laterite hill, one and half kilometer away from Mattanur, a small town in the eastern part of Kannur District, with an area of 16.5 acres is a part of 105.5 acre cashew and teak plantation owned by the Management. A 'Butterfly Garden', a 'Medicinal Plant Garden' and 'Mango Germplasm' in the campus add to the richness of its biodiversity.
- The institution conducted Green Audit at three levels; energy audit, water audit and biodiversity audit with the support of staff and student community of the college to encourage green consciousness among the stake holders.
- Rain water is being collected in the inbuilt catchment area of the campus so as to recharge the ground water. We have two rainwater harvesting tanks of 1 lakh liter capacity each.
- Extreme care is taken in managing the hazardous wastes like chemicals and acids from the laboratories
- There is a vermin compost unit in the campus and pipe composts near every block to process the organic waste.
- Inter Library Loan Service, Little Library, Online examinations, Courses of NPTEL, MOODLE, Student IQAC, WWS, SSP, SSS and ASAP are some of the innovations introduced during the last five years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Best Practices

- i LEAD- Inculcating Learner Enthusiasm and Awareness of Democracy
 - As young citizens of our country the students have to be weaned towards loftier democratic concepts, detailed processes and mature practices which would enable them to accept and reciprocate the various themes associated with democracy like free and fearless articulation of ideas, tolerance towards opposition, synthesis of ideas and opinions, consensus building and sensitivity to secular values. There is also the need to acquaint the students with various processes like elections, representation, committee habits, organizing agenda based discussions and maintaining protocols. The students also need to be trained in organizing meetings, functions, competitions and cultural programs. These are the goals of the best practice conceived under the present title.
- i SERVE- Initiative for Service, Extension, Reformation and Volunteering in Education Learning process has to be seamlessly merged with various kinds of service and extension activities both for placing education on firm social grounds and also for inculcating a sense of volunteerism among the students. Often the under graduate curricula and syllabi do not go hand in hand with the immediate social reality from which the student community is drawn. Under such conditions education stands the danger of becoming an esoteric practice leading to learner passivity. Therefore the College has come up with various kinds of activities which would reinforce formal curricular transactions with service, extension and volunteering activities to make the learning process active, inclusive and socially oriented.

The vision and mission of the institution are included in the prospectus, student's handbook, teacher's work diary, college newsletter, "Impressions" and website. It is also displayed in all the Departments, the central library, college office and the Principal's chamber.

To teachers: Every academic year starts with a general teaching staff meeting especially to refresh the ideas on vision and mission of the college so as to re orient themselves to achieve the goal.

To parents and students: College IQAC conducts orientation programme for the freshers and their parents. Vision, mission and functional aspects of the college are explained in order to ensure their support to maintain the quality standard of the college.

To non-teaching staff/administrative staff: The Principal communicates the vision, mission and objectives during staff meetings.

Other stakeholders: The college prospectus and application form printed with vision and missions are distributed to students seeking admission in our college. The college newsletter, "Impressions" carries the message to other institutions, parents and the public.

- Feedback collected from students, parents and alumni are analyzed and suggestions submitted to the University regarding employability of the course, need for job oriented training, strict adherence to examination schedule and timely publication of result.
- Since most of the commerce postgraduates seeks job abroad, our faculty recognized the need for a course in international financial management. They represented the same in upper bodies of the University and recommended for introducing an additional paper on International Financial Management for the PG programme.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

Yes, the institution develops curricula for the various certificate courses offered by it as add on courses for undergraduate students. The details on the process are given below:

- Needs Assessment: The needs assessment of the courses is done through both formal and informal methods. The generally perceived needs, the explicit needs that come up during tutorial and other interactions with the students, the special skills and abilities of the faculty to act as resource persons for such courses, and the infrastructural facilities in the institution are the major parameters for deciding on the type, theme and tenure of such courses.
- **Design:** The responsibility for designing the curriculum is undertaken by the parent department which proposes to conduct the course. Curricula are designed within certain broad parameters stipulated by the institution. Being a certificate course of an add-on nature care is taken to ensure that the curricula contain an equitable mix of theory, practice and the development of specific skills. The elements of the curricula are mentioned in the specific curriculum statements of the respective courses. Mostly these courses are single module courses which would guarantee extra credits to the students when they go for employment or higher studies. The effective implementation of the curricular aspects and the administrative role is played by the parent department which offers the course.
- Curriculum Development: The aid and advice of external experts and resource persons are sought while developing specific curricula. Special care is also taken to ensure that the course is endowed with a contemporary and practical content. Basically there are two specific aspects that the institutional level curricula hope to achieve. The first is to develop those skills which are not specifically addressed by the undergraduate curricula prescribed by the university. The second is to augment the campus life of the students by providing them with opportunities for cultural interactions and skill development.
- Curriculum Planning: The curricula are planned in keeping with the needs of the students and the nature of the courses to be offered. Various factors like the general time table for the undergraduate courses, the co-curricular activities and extracurricular activities, examination calendar published by the University are taken into consideration while planning the fine details of the course.

- Certificate course in Introduction to Latex, a technical documentation tool
- Certificate course in Mushroom Cultivation
- Foundation course in Human Rights Education

- Certificate course in Hindi Translation
- Certificate Course in DTP in Hindi
- Certificate Course in Spoken Hindi
- Certificate course in Classical Dance: Theory and Performance
- Certificate Course in Computer Hardware Maintenance & Networking

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

- Continuous evaluations of students are done through test papers, assignments, seminars and viva voce.
- Departments prepare a report on activities at the end of every semester.
- Academic committee conducts semester wise academic auditing.
- Student performance, department reports and academic audit reports are analyzed in IQAC meeting and the suggestions are forwarded to the college council. Departments implement the recommendations with the support of the faculty.
- Career guidance and counseling cell provides placement and conducts orientation programmes on carries opportunities for students.
- Departments conduct orientation programmes on higher study options and ensure their enrolment.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The institution offered eleven certificate courses during the last five years for the academic and integral development of our students.

1. Certificate course on Basic Computational Skills and Graphics (Conducted by Department of Physics, 2016-17)

Needs Assessment: The emerging technological society demands professionals highly competent in handling computational and graphical softwares. So it is the responsibility of higher education institutions to train the students with adequate soft skills along with the conventional courses. The UG students pursuing BA or B.Sc. courses usually find it difficult to prepare project reports which are a part of their curriculum due to their inefficiency in exploring necessary softwares. This prompted the Department of Physics to launch an add-on course in Basic Computational Skills and Graphics.

Aspects of the Course:

- **Design:** The course was designed in such a way so that the students could undergo it and complete its requirements without jeopardizing their regular subjects. The various elements of the course are theory of MS office, applications of different software used for computation and graphics and the method of preparing a project report. The course comprises three modules which would guarantee extra credits to the students when they go for higher studies. The effective implementation of the curricular aspects and the administrative role is played by the Department of Physics which offers the course.
- Curriculum Development: The aid and advice of external experts and resource persons were sought while developing specific curricula. Special care was also taken to ensure that the course is endowed with a contemporary and practical content. Basically there are two specific aspects that the institutional level curricula hope to achieve. The first is to develop those skills which are not specifically addressed by the undergraduate curricula prescribed by the university. The second is to augment the campus life of the students by providing them with opportunities for scientific interactions and skill development.

Graduate Attributes

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to

- 1. Gain a basic understanding of Microsoft office.
- 2. To train students capable to do complicated calculations in easier way using excel programme.
- 3. Acquire the fundamentals of graphics using excel and origin
- 4. To develop an ability to prepare a project report.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Assignments, Internal Examinations and Viva-Voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous evaluation with a detailed written examination and practical examination could be conducted as the final examination. The CE: ECE ratio shall be 1:1.

2. Certificate course in Introduction to Latex, a technical documentation tool (Conducted by Department of Mathematics, 2016-17)

Need Assessment: With the development of digital technology and various softwares and programming languages, the learning and teaching procedure became globalized. Hence practice of such software based languages has become part and parcel of academicians as well as students. Therefore the department felt that there was a latent need among the students for acquiring basic expertise on some softwares and offered a specific documentation tool - Latex. Instead of conducting a formal need assessment process, the Department made an announcement among the students regarding the course and the response was positive.

Aspects of the Course:

- Design: The course was designed in such a way so that the students could undergo it and complete its requirements to complement their regular subjects. The various elements of the course are documentation types, logical commands, mathematical packages etc. The course comprises two modules which would guarantee extra credits to the students when they go for employment or higher studies.
- Curriculum Development: The aid and advice of external experts and resource persons were sought while developing specific curricula. Special care was also taken to ensure that the course is endowed with an updated and practical content. The important aspect of the curricula is to achieve skills which are not specifically addressed by the under graduate curricula prescribed by the university.

Graduate Attributes

Upon Completion of the Course the Student will be able to

- 1. Acquire skills to use digital knowledge resources in learning.
- 2. Gain a basic understanding of a new type setting software which is very useful for mathematics people.
- 3. Attain digital method for easy writing of articles, letters, project, thesis etc.
- 4. Gain basic knowledge regarding various mathematical softwares.
- 5. Make uniformity in documentation involving mathematical contents.
- 6. Make interaction between mathematical skill and digital logic.
- 7. Undertake study of various other softwares, especially mathematical softwares.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Assignments, Seminars, Internal Examinations and Viva-Voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous Evaluation while a detailed written examination and practical examination could be conducted as the final examination. The CE:ECE ratio shall be 2:3

3. Certificate Course in Mushroom Cultivation

(Conducted by Department of Botany, 2016-17)

Need Assessment: Kerala is rich in educated manpower and bio-resources. However, there is deficiency in skilled manpower for translating technologies into products and services. For example, there are a number of Biological R & D institutions and universities developing biotechnologies in Kerala. Their technologies are readily available for transfer to rural as well as urban areas for livelihood and employment generation.

Aspects of the course

- **Design**: Mycology is a broad discipline, conventionally associated with Botany/Plant science courses. It is the study on mushrooms. Mushrooms are defined as those fungi, which produce macroscopic fruit-bodies having gills. Their biology is more elaborate than that of the other fungi conventionally called micro-fungi. Edible species of mushrooms have been cultivated for long. It is an art and technology. However there is distinct demarcation between mushroom cultivation technology and more sophisticated mushroom biotechnology. Therefore, the present course is conveniently divided into 2 subcategories viz. Mycology and mushroom biology and Applied mushroom Biology and Bio-technology.
- Curriculum Development: Curriculum for the course has been developed by the faculty of the department in consultation with External experts and Central R & D institutes.

Graduate attributes

Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to

- 1. Take up assignments in production centers as Assistants, mushroom technologists, production managers etc.
- 2. Establish and operate own enterprises in mushroom production and marketing.
- 3. Train unemployed youths in the field.

Assessment and Evaluation

Performance of students will be assessed by conducting theory and practical examinations at the end of the course which spans from June to March. The certificate course carries 20 credits and grading system will be followed as in the case of other UG Courses. Evaluation shall comprise both internal and external components. The board of examiners shall decide the pattern of question papers for theory and practical examinations.

4. Foundation Course in Human Rights Education

(Sponsored by UGC & conducted by Department of Economics 2011-16)

Need Assessment:

The Foundation Course in Human Rights Education intends to promote the 2 core values proposed by NAAC- contribution to national development and inculcate a value system among the students. In recent years, nations all over the world are witnessing disturbing trends in the form of violence and terrorism. The course aims to sensitize and humanize the younger generation so that they will be a part of the solution and not of the problem. The course will provide conditions for fuller realization of the human potential. It will help to channelize the human potential for constructive development of the society and thereby attain the overall vision of building a human, participatory and democratic society. Legal literacy in the form of rights education would contribute to the enhancement of dignity and empowerment of the marginalized and excluded sections of the society, especially the women community. Human Rights Education also focuses on value education. It creates awareness and commitment to values where the individualistic self- interest is properly reconciled with the collective and common good. The Course will help develop respect for human rights and ensure that both teachers and students practice those values in their everyday life.

Design:

The UGC Model Curriculum on Human Rights was followed as the syllabus. The course was of 3 months duration every year.

Curriculum Development & Planning:

The course was implemented using internal and external resource persons. The department conducted legal awareness classes and moot courts as part of the course. The department celebrated the World Human Rights Day in collaboration with the District Legal Services Authority in the years 2013 and 2014.

Evaluation

The evaluation was done on the basis of a test paper and certificates were given to the students who successfully completed the course.

5. Certificate course in Accounting and Taxation (Conducted by Department of Commerce, 2014-15)

Needs Assessment

In the most modern business era which is characterized by E- banking, the pace of the transaction is comparatively high. With the high volume of trade both domestic and international the system and modes operandi of accounting also went through tremendous transformation. Despite being a paper of B.Com course pupil are less oriented and unaware of the present accounting requirement. They get very less regarding the practical aspects of the accounting and taxation. At times syllabus doesn't reflect the real market demand and requirement of being conformed to the prevalent knowledge base. Hence it is thought prudent to launch a new course in the spectrum of accounting and taxation.

Nomenclature: The course programme is entitled as "Certificate course in Accounting and Taxation" and the mere name of the course implies what actually the programme is meant for. As the name indicates, it covers practical areas of accounting and taxation.

Aspects of the course:

- **Design**: Utmost care and diligence is employed in the designing of the course to ensure that the programme doesn't collide and overlap with the regular curricular subjects. The schedule and timing of the course is framed in such a way that students can undergo it without losing their regular classes and the same can be concluded before the academic year comes to an end. In that way the design promises real value addition to the beneficiaries. Course comprises of five modules and each module is having a specified percentage of practical problems to solve in the class room learning atmosphere. Each module is structured to see that it helps the students in varied ways while pursuing employment in future after its successful completion.
- Curriculum Development: The curricula is enriched with the guidance and expertise of eminent financial analyst, professional experts like CA, CS, CMA, Research guides, scholars and the officials of DIC. Syllabus is not over burdened with unnecessary remarks on obsolete and irrelevant database. Curriculum is inclusive of daily business transactions which otherwise is not incorporated in the syllabi of B.Com. The curricula as such may be treated as a pool of academic resources and brain exercise to address the inquisitive academic fraternity.

Graduate Attributes

On successful completion of the course the student will be able to achieve the following:

- 1. Acquire a basic understanding of the practical accounting and the origin of the transactions
- 2. Analyze the various source documents before proceeding to accounts
- 3. Preparation and analysis of financial statements

- 4. Understand the auditing terminology and procedures usually followed by Chartered accountants
- 5. Identify the need of preparing the audit working papers.
- 6. Calculate the income tax of Individuals and corporate and Filing of IT Return
- 7. Gain knowledge on corporate tax planning with due consideration for tax exemptions and deductions.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The evaluation processes consists of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Assignments, Seminars, Internal Examinations and Viva-Voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous Evaluation while a detailed written examination and practical examination could be conducted as the final examination. The proportion of continuous evaluation and end course evaluation is 7:3.

6. Certificate course in Photography

(Conducted by Department of English, 2016-17)

Need Assessment: With the emergence of multimedia technology and the prevalence of various types of digital devices, the exposure to the art and practice of photography has almost become a part and parcel of daily life for everyone. Photography has become an essential part of new social media interactions and the knowledge of photography has become a social skill in the present times. Therefore the department felt that there was a latent need among the students for acquiring basic expertise in photography. Instead of conducting a formal needs assessment process the department made an announcement among the students regarding the course and the response was overwhelming. In addition to this, since the department was offering "Journalism" as a complementary course for B.A in English Language and Literature the department was already availing the services of a guest lecturer for the course and it was felt that his help could be sought for designing and implementing the course.

Aspects of the Course:

- **Design:** The course was designed in such a way so that the students could undergo it and complete its requirements without jeopardizing their regular subjects. The various elements of the course are theory of photography, history of photography, hands on training in the use of various kinds of cameras, digital technology and the use of various kinds of application software. The course comprises a single module which would guarantee extra credits to the students when they go for employment or higher studies. It would begin with a summary assessment of the history of photography and move on to the contemporary scenario and culminate in the inculcation of hands on skills. The effective implementation of the curricular aspects and the administrative role is played by the Department of English which offers the course.
- Curriculum Development: The aid and advice of external experts and resource persons were sought while developing specific curricula. Special care was also taken to ensure that the course is endowed with a contemporary and practical content. Basically there are two specific aspects that the institutional level curricula hope to achieve. The first is to develop those skills which are not specifically addressed by the undergraduate curricula prescribed by the university. The second is to augment the campus life of the students by providing them with opportunities for cultural interactions and skill development.

Graduate Attributes

Upon Completion of the Course the Student will be able to

1. Gain a basic understanding of the history of the origin and development of photography.

- 2. Gain a basic understanding of the development of the camera and the related technology.
- 3. Gain a basic understanding of the contemporary trends in photography.
- 4. To assimilate photo-journalism as a specific subject and vocation.
- 5. To develop and understand the ethical and legal implications of journalism and photoiournalism.
- 6. To gain hands on training in the use of various kinds of cameras and related
- 7. To gain basic knowledge regarding video photography.
- 8. To familiarize themselves with the basics of digital photography and the use of various kinds of application software used for editing and storing images.
- 9. To appreciate the basics of cyber law provisions with regard to the use of phones and Photography.
- 10. To put photography to use in various social situations for the furtherance of national, social and cultural values.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Assignments, Seminars, Internal Examinations and Viva-Voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous Evaluation while a detailed written examination and practical examination could be conducted as the final examination. The CE: ECE ratio shall be 50:50

7. Certificate course in Hindi Translation

(Conducted by Department of Hindi, 2014-15)

Needs Assessment: There are plenty of job opportunities in mass communication media especially AIR, Doordarshan and other private channels. Consequently there is a large demand for translators. Candidates who have learned Hindi as a subject at graduation level along with good skills in translation can easily get placed. This motivated the department to commence a course in translation.

Aspects of the course:

- **Design**: The course is designed in such a way to improve the student's translation skills leading to a job. The various parts of the course include practical and theory parts of the translation. This will enable the students to build adequate knowledge and proficiency in translation.
- Curricular Development: Special care taken to ensure the course will have a contemporary and practical knowledge about Translation. Basically the course is having two aspects i.e. institutional level curricular development and skill development. Moreover the students can learn the techniques of translation.

Graduate Attributes:

- 1. Upon completion of the course the students will be able to do translation.
- 2. Gain a basic understanding of the Hindi-English language structure.
- 3. To develop the knowledge about basic theories of Hindi English translation and vice
- 4. They can understand knowledge about Different types of translation.

Assessment and evaluation

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end course assessments. Assignments, Seminar, Internal Examination and Viva Voce will be conducted to assess the progress of the students. A detailed written examination along with practical also will be conducted as the final examination. The CE-ECE ratio will be 1:1.

8. Certificate course in DTP in Hindi

(Conducted by Department of Hindi, 2015-16)

Need assessment – As per the contemporary market, a page of Hindi work if want to get typed we have to give Rs. 70. It is very easy to understand the Hindi Key's in the keyboard and the students can earn while they learn.

Aspects of the course

• **Design** – The course is designed for graduation students without affecting their regular studies. The course structure is not theoretical, it is almost practical.

Graduate Attributes

After completing the DTP Course, the students can able to

- 1. Understand the main software's used in Hindi computing
- 2. They can type materials
- 3. They will be familiar with different Hindi fonts.
- 4. They can choose this as a profession to earn money.
- 5. They can understand about UNICODE

Assessment and evaluation

The evaluation consists of both continuous and final valuation also. Continuous valuation consists of seminar, viva, assignments and test papers. Practical Examination will be there for the final examination. The CE-ECE ratio will be 1:1.

9. Certificate Course in Spoken Hindi

(Conducted by Department of Hindi, 2016-17)

Need Assessment: Hindi is the National language of India and is spoken in many parts of the country. For many people who travel around the country knowledge of this language is an essential need. Department of Hindi has a communicative approach to the course offered by them. Various stories, plays, dialogues, discussions, debates etc are used to teach the language is an enjoyable and easy manner. By the end of the Spoken Hindi Course, students are expected to read and communicate in simple Hindi.

Aspects of the course:

- **Design**: The course was designed in such a way so that the students could undergo it and complete its requirements with their regular portions of study. The various elements of the course are grammatical portions and the use of grammar in practical lessons. The effective implementation of the curricular aspects and the administrative role is played by the Department of Hindi which offers the course.
- Curricular Development: The aid and advice of external experts and resource persons were sought while developing specific curricula. Special care was also taken to ensure that the course is endowed with a contemporary and practical content. Basically there are two specific aspects that the institutional level curricula hope to achieve. The first is to develop these skills which are not specifically addressed by the undergraduate curricula prescribed by the University. The second is to augment the campus life of the students by providing them with opportunities for language development and improving the communicative skills.

Graduate Attributes:

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to

- 1. Gain a basic understanding of the Hindi language.
- 2. To develop the knowledge about basic words, pronouns, Verbs, genders, adjectives of Hindi language.
- 3. To gain basic knowledge about the Hindi numbers.
- 4. To develop the knowledge about Tense in Hindi.
- 5. To gain the knowledge of translation of simple sentences.

- 6. To develop the knowledge of understanding stories, letters, composition.
- 7. To gain the knowledge of writing stories (small), letters and composition.

Assessment and evaluation

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Assignments, Seminars, Internal Examinations and Viva-voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous Evaluation while a detailed written examination and practical examination could be conducted as the final examination. The CE: ECE ratio shall be 1:1.

10. Certificate Course in Classical Dance: Theory and Performance (Conducted by Department of Malayalam, 2014-17)

Need Assessment: The technological and digital culture today prompt the students to get away from the traditions of rich classical dance forms and embrace the pop and rock dance modes accelerated by the postmodern global scenario. Of course this in turn will lead to cultural erosions and extinction of classical art forms in the campus. Many talented students having better taste in the traditional art forms are getting admission every year. If the campus can create a favorable atmosphere for them to pursue the indigenous art forms that will integrally help them not only in proving their expertise in performing in the University art festivals but also help in integrating the rich cultural texture of classical dance forms. If any student who wishes to learn the higher levels of performance this certificate course will help them a lot.

When the NAAC Peer Team visited our college in 2010, they suggested that Department of Malayalam should initiate a certificate course in dance. They made this suggestion after witnessing the cultural programme conducted in our college by Dr. Sumitha Nair, HOD Malayalam and a performer of classical dance with the students during their visit.

Aspects of the Course:

- **Design:** The course is conceived in such a way without disturbing the regular time table of the college. The course will provide the basic theoretical knowledge enriched by the Acharyas beginning from Bharathamuni and the many. An acquaintance with the presumptions of Natyasasthra will be delivered. The gradual progress and innovations from within the Classical frame work will be introduced to the students. The major Art forms discussed will be Mohiniyattam, Bharathanatyam and Kuchupudi.
 - Apart from the theoretical discussions the course will focus on the performance too. A well disciplined performance practice will be the essential thrust of the course.
- Curriculum Development: The expertise of the faculty inside and outside will be sought to fulfill the mission. The curricula thus developed after proper discussions will be finalized. The attempt to bridge the classical theory and the contemporary theme will be an innovative pedagogy the course will indirectly focus. The art of choreography will be intimated to make experiments in the art forms.
- **Selection of the students**: 15 students from the first year degree course will be selected based on their knowledge and performance aptitudes.

Graduate Attributes

Upon Completion of the Course the Student will be able to

- 1. Gain a basic understanding of the history of the origin and development of classical dance Forms.
- 2. Gain a basic understanding of the development of the classical dance forms through the different eras.
- 3. Gain a basic understanding of the theory and practice of various dance forms.
- 4. Make a cumulative synthesis of theory and practice to evolve innovations in choreography.

- 5. To acquire the cultural understanding of the lives and conditions of the people through art
- 6. Differentiate a gender based critical approach to the various dance forms.

Assessment and Evaluation:

The evaluation shall consist of both continuous and end of the course assessments. Internal Examinations and Viva-Voce shall be conducted as a part of Continuous Evaluation while a detailed written examination and practical examination will be conducted as the final examination

11. Certificate Course in Computer Hardware Maintenance & Networking (Conducted by College Central Library, 2016-17)

Needs Assessment: Computer and communication technologies are one of the most significant technologies which changed the world that we live in and made the life more convenient. With internet and mobile phones, communication has crossed all barriers. Students especially who study arts, humanities and basic science subjects may have a little knowledge in ICT than students furnishing technological courses. In order to cope with drastic changes going on day by day in the field of ICT, our students have to acquire more technical knowledge through special training. The main aim of this course is to make them understand about the fundamental components, technologies and their integration, to operate information systems effectively and to self rectify the technical problems occurred to a certain extent. Service of an external trainer helps to run the course in a successful way.

Aspects of the Course:

- **Design:** The course is designed to give a comprehensive idea about computer and its peripherals, functions and state of the art technologies in the field within a short span of time (three months duration). The program will be a catalyst for shaping the future studies of interested students to the broad discipline of computer science and technology.
- Curriculum Development: The curriculum of the course is framed and executed on the basis of the needs of students their abilities and interests to bring about skills in computer hardware maintenance and networking of students in college and out of college situations. The hands on sessions help students' active engagement and ensure student-instructor interaction.

Graduate Attributes

Computer knowledge is in high demand no matter what career the students will be involved in. Upon completion of the course the Student will be able to

- 1. understand the history of computers, developments and latest technologies
- 2. gain basic knowledge in assembling, networking etc
- 3. get a general idea about the customization and operation.
- 4. provide information how to install different application software
- 5. learn how to work independently and work on his own.
- 6. a lot of money and time can be saved by the system self servicing.
- 7. build up their higher education in computer science if he is interested to explore
- 8. work as free-lancer and start their own enterprise
- 9. do immediate service for the college if required

Our institution offers 10 UG, 2 PG and 1 Ph.D programme.

Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options

- UG and PG progammes are under Choice Based Course, Credit and Semester System (CBCCSS).
- Students from the science stream can opt for Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology and Plant Science at the UG level. They can also opt for social sciences like History and Economics and literature like English and Hindi. Commerce students can apply for the same options except science subjects. Arts students can opt for social science and literature. B.Com students can gain admission to the PG programme in Commerce and B.Sc. mathematics students to M.Sc. Mathematics.
- In addition to the common, core and complementary courses students from all disciplines can also opt for open courses offered by various departments. The institution conducted eleven certificate courses in various subjects aiming to improve the potential for employability of the students.
- Ph D programme is offered by the research department of Chemistry. Admission to this programme is possible for those who have PG degree in Chemistry or Allied Chemistry.

Courses offered in modular form

- In CBCCS System courses are in modular form. An undergraduate programme shall have a minimum of 120 credits.
- With the introduction of Choice Based Course Credit and Semester System the students get options to choose one subject having two credits from a list of open courses offered by the college. A student can also opt for additional courses over and above the minimum required courses. This provides limited academic flexibility to the students.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility

- The affiliating University does not permit to move from one course to another.
 There is also no flexibility in time frame as far as the University courses are concerned.
- A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/she secures not less than 75% attendance in each semester. Condonation for shortage of attendance for a maximum of 12 days at the most for two spells within a programme may be granted subject to existing University rules. A student who is not eligible for such condonation shall repeat the course when it is offered again.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

- Lateral mobility of students from all disciplines can be assured by opting for open courses offered by various departments.
- Vertical mobility is possible in the case of Commerce and Mathematics students. They have the option to join for PG programme in our college itself.

Enrichment courses

- The institution offers Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) initiated by KSHEC, Government of Kerala, Walk with a Scholar (WWS) programme, a new initiative by the Department of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala and the Scholar Support Programme, part of the New Initiatives in Higher Education initiated by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Kerala.
- The college had been a training partner institution for the 30 day residential training programme of ASAP and the Department of English is in charge of the conduct of the programme in addition to providing resource persons. Two batches of foundation course is also completed.
- The institution has offered eleven certificate courses during the last 4 years for which we are allowing flexibility in time frame. The student is given the certificate when he/she completes definite number of modules.
- The college conducts Academic Enrichment Programmes every year like invited lectures and workshops.
- The components of the continuous evaluation viz. assignments, projects, debates, quizzes promote interaction, team work and leadership among students. Cocurricular activities organized by the departmental clubs and associations envisage improvement of the academic standard during the transaction of the curriculum.
- To improve potential for employability, ED Club, NSS, Womens Cell and central library has organised training programmes like Jewelry making, Glass Painting, Stitching, Soap making, Pickling, , Umbrella making, Book binding etc.

 - Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP)

The institution is a Training Partner of ASAP of KSHEC, Government of Kerala.

Government of Kerala has initiated an ambitious programme, the Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) with the objective of tackling the issue of growing unemployment in the state. The programme aims at equipping selected school/college students with skills in Communication, IT and selected areas of industry and service sectors. ASAP has been launched in the college during 2012-13. The classes under ASAP are engaged by Skill Development Executives identified by the Government/Industry, generally for one hour on working days, before/after the normal working hours of the institution. The college has arranged rooms with computers and LCD facilities (Smart Class Rooms) to conduct the classes. Two batches have completed the foundation course also.

Coaching for entry in services for SC/ST/OBC(non- creamy layer) & minorities Academic programmes of our college are in harmony with the institutional goals and objectives. We have 80% plus pass percentage in almost all Departments. 40% of the students go for higher studies. 90% of the students of our college are from the radius of 30 kilometers from the rural areas. 80% of students are girls. Of the total strength during 2012-2013 of 1100, 60 students belongs to SC, 40 –ST, 421 -OBC and 84 – Minority community.

In order to overcome the current challenges, it is needed to uplift the performance of the students belonging to economically and educationally backward sections. Social empowerment of rural girls can only be addressed by giving specific provisions

UGC sanctioned the financial assistance for coaching classes for entry in services for SC/ST/OBC(non-creamy layer) & Minorities, during the 11th plan and the college has been conducting the programme from 2009 onwards. More than 750 students benefitted from the programme in these three years and 12 of our students have already employed in State Public Services and Armed Forces.

Entrepreneurial skill development programmes

Entrepreneurship Development Club: A part of the state wide scheme formulated by the Department of Industries and Commerce, Govt. of Kerala, in association with the Department of Education to inculcate entrepreneurial culture among the students.

Physical Training to the students and the public

The Department of Physical Education offers free physical training to the students and the public for army, police, fire force and paramilitary recruitment

Finishing School to PG students

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

In order to integrate the academic programmes with our goals and objectives, the institution supplements the university curriculum with both pedagogical innovations and co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

- Providing adequate learning resources such as library books, journals, internet, museums and sophisticated laboratories to the students.
- Conducting curriculum enrichment programmes like certificate courses in allied topics.
- Motivating to join online courses offered by NPTEL
- Walk With a Scholar (WWS) scheme by the Department of Collegiate Education, Govt. Of Kerala which proposes to arrange specialized mentoring programs for students in Under Graduate Programs in Arts, Science and Commerce and to provide guidance for their future. The scheme introduces the idea of mentoring and builds on the concept of mentor as a Guide and Friend. The mentoring scheme for students is purely voluntary in nature. It is open for students entering the first year of the Under Graduate Programme of Study. The scheme is successfully running in the college from 2014 -2015.
- The Scholar Support Programme (SSP), initiated by Govt. of Kerala aims at imparting additional support to students in curricular areas of weakness. The programme was launched in the college in 2014-2015. Subjects in which additional curricular support given were selected based on result analysis carried out by the college. Salient features of the programme include personalized additional support to students, tutorials, study materials, additional lectures, question banks and interactive sessions.
- Our institution is functioning in a rural area and the students belong to economically and educationally backward families. Extra care and efforts are required to uplift their performance, to promote their talents and to equip them to meet the current changes and challenges. We have effectively utilized the fund allotted for Remedial coaching for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) and minorities during XI plan period by conducting 932 classes from 2009 to 2012. Around 450 students were benefitted from this programme, which was reflected in our University results. Further the infra structure and library facilities were also improved a lot by utilizing non-recurring grant.
- Tutorial sessions and peer teaching helps to improve the performance of students in academics.
- "Little Libraries" in all classes using books donated by faculty and students helps to develop the reading habits of the students.
- Organizing seminars, exhibitions and workshops which provides innovative learning experiences.
- Encouraging students' union to organize invited lectures, debates, street plays and inter collegiate programmmes to revamp their critical thinking.
- Organizing programmes in association with Society for Promotion of Indian

- Classical Music and Culture Among Youth (SPICMACAY) to familiarize various art forms of different states of our country by "Arangu", the Arts Forum of the college,
- Supporting the students to organize cultural and sports fest in the college and ensure their participation in University and inter University level competitions to promote their latent talents and special skills.
- Enrollment of students in National Service Scheme and National Cadet Corps.
- Conducting Departmental Club Activities which improves students' interpersonal relations, social commitments and leadership qualities.
- Undertaking outreach and extension programmes by departments which ensure institutional social responsibility.
- Conducting environmental awareness campaigns, maintaining diversity parks, gardening, and green auditing helps in eco-sensitisation.
- Beginning everyday with a prayer (few lines from Tagore's Geethanjali) and concluding with National Anthem helps to foster diversity. College celebrates most of the religious festivals, both state and national level and observes days of national and international importance.
- Organizing Annual Merit Fest by PTA, alumni and students' union to felicitate the toppers in the University examinations, arts festival and sports meet motivates the students.

- Free tailoring classes given to women in the adopted Ambedkar Colony (SC/ST colony) by NSS and Vanithavedi.
- Activities of NSS units
 - Cancer survey training for the volunteers in connection with "Sanjeevani Cancer Detection Programme" conducted by Mattanur Municipality, Mini Arts and Sports Club and Malabar Cancer Centre.
 - o Pain & Palliative care programmes. The volunteers donated a wheel chair to a bedridden senior citizen.
 - o Visits to old age home and orphanages.
 - o AIDs awareness programmes.
 - o Joined with the mass drug administration programme of State Health Department for the eradication of filariasis and polio.
 - o Anti-tobacco march conducted with the support of State Health Department.
 - Health survey at Panichery and Devarkad wards during 'Manavakarunya Yathra' organized by Kidney Foundation of India. Free kidney defect detection and eye care camp were also organized during the event.
 - Constructed and donated four houses, two under the scheme, 'Sahapadikkoru Veedu' to Mr. Santhosh and Smt. Prabina and the other two to Mr. Kabeer and Ms. Preena under 'Home for Homeless' programme.
- Our college took part in the mass run "Run Kerala Run," in connection with the 35th National Games which was hosted in Kerala. The Government announced one hour interval for offices, colleges & schools from 10.30 am to 11.30 am to enable government employees and students to participate in the run. About 1200 members including students, teachers and non teaching staff participated in the event.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

• Feedback on curriculum is collected through a printed format from the final year students of all disciplines just before the commencement of the final

examinations.

- Feedback from peers and alumni are collected regularly.
- A significant contribution in this direction is also provided by the Retired Teachers Forum functioning in the institution.
- The feedback is analyzed centrally and the evaluation report is handed over to the
 concerned departments. They are discussed in the departmental meetings and the
 suggestions are forwarded to the BOS and other university bodies.
 Recommendations of our faculty members in the upper statutory bodies of the
 University also played a role in shifting the existing evaluation system from
 direct grading to indirect grading system.
- The general outcome of the feedback is also discussed in the college council for the necessary modification possible in the institution.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- All enrichment programmes are planned, instituted and monitored by committees consisting of the faculty and students as members presided by the Principal.
- The committees always give utmost importance in assuring the availability of the top resource personnel.
- In the case of programmes supported by external agencies, we always stick to the prescribed norms and conditions.
- Student evaluation in the form of reviews and suggestions are collected in department meetings.
- Reviews and suggestions are also collected from alumni and PTS meetings.
- After preliminary discussions in the department, recommendations are submitted to the college council.
- If needed, the same is submitted before the management for ratification.
- Monitoring and evaluation of NSS activities are under NSS advisory committee.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Curriculum is designed mainly by the academic bodies of the University. But the institution has made critical interventions in the modification of the curriculum in the following ways:

- Feedback taken from students and alumni on curriculum and results of UG programmes are analyzed in the college council and departmental meetings to identify the problems.
- Corrective measures and suggestions are communicated to the concerned Board of Studies through the Head of the department/Principal/members in the academic bodies.
- Faculty members in the statutory academic bodies of Kannur University like Board of Studies, Academic Council, Faculty of Sciences, Social Sciences, Management studies and languages are actively involved in framing the curriculum

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. The institution has formal mechanisms to obtain feedback from students, parents and alumni on curriculum. They are:

- Students collected in prescribed format at the end of even semester.
- Parents Department-wise PTA meetings.
- Alumni Annual alumni meet.

The feedback thus collected are discussed in department meetings, academic committee and college staff council and the suggestions are communicated to the concerned Boards of Studies through the Head of the department/Principal/members in the academic bodies.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

M.Sc. Mathematics and B.Sc. Plant Science are the two programmes introduced during the last four years. Aided couse in M.Sc. Mathematics will increase the higher study opportunities of students who are socially and economically backward. B Sc Plant Science programme offered in language reduced pattern offers more job opportunities.

1.4.4 Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

IQAC conducted a seminar series named 'Academic Enrichment Programme', in association with various departments. The programme lasted for 12 days during which eminent resource persons interacted with the faculty and students.

CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission?

The college meticulously follows the admission criteria laid by Kannur University and has a legitimate and well organized procedure for admitting the first year UG and PG students. As soon as the University notifies the norms and date of admission, the college publicizes the details through

- Website
- Brochure and advertisements in news papers.
- College prospectus which contains the details of the UG and PG programmes offered by the college and fee structure

In addition to this the Management, alumni and PTA also cooperate in dissemination of information regarding the admission procedure.

To ensure transparency, the admission process is monitored by centralized admission committee constituting the Principal, Head of all departments and representatives of non-teaching staff. The merit list of the students is prepared centrally using the admission software and verified by the concerned departments. The final list of eligible students is published in the college notice board on a fixed date declared earlier and a copy is forwarded to the University. The date of admission is communicated to the selected students well in advance by certificate of posting. Arrangements are made in the Office and departments to address admission related queries of parents and students.

Unlike in the previous years, Kannur University adopted single window system for the admission to UG courses from the academic year 2015-16. The admission nodal officer of the college negotiates the procedural formalities with the University for the Smooth Conduct of admission. The college effectively administered the reformed admission procedure with utmost transparency.

- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
 - Students are selected for admission strictly on merit basis in the qualifying examination, except in the management quota.
 - 50% of the seats in each discipline are filled from general category, 20% seats are reserved for SC/ST category, 10% for forward/ Nair community and the remaining 20% from management quota.
 - In general category, one seat is reserved for differently abled students and 2 seats for sportsmen for each discipline.
 - Students from Lakshadweep Islands are also admitted in the additional seats sanctioned by the University, as per the directions of the Government.
 - The entry level eligibility criterion is that student must have secured at least 40% of total marks in the qualifying examination for UG admission and 45% marks for PG admission.

• The admission committee recommends considering students with not less than 60% marks for admission in science stream and not less than 50% in arts in management quota.

Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The college follows the guidelines of the admission process laid down by the University of Kannur which provides information on the schedule of the admissions, publication of merit list and mode of payment of fees. The college admission committee with the admission nodal officer as the convener makes the necessary arrangements for the admission. Single window system for admission to UG courses has been introduced by Kannur University, 2015-16 onwards which has made the enrolment procedure easier and transparent.

The admission processes is reviewed in departmental meetings and by the college staff council. Based on this review, disparities if any and recommendations to improve the admission processes are communicated to the university by the admission nodal officer.

The following revisions has been brought about as per the recommendations of the staff council and the admission committee

- Centralized system for preparation of rank list using admission software. This consumes much less time unlike in the previous years when the sorting of applications and preparation of rank lists was done manually
- Decentralization of verification of students' certificates at the time of admission. This has simplified the admission procedure.
- Necessary arrangements done and helpdesk provided to effectively implement single window system

The compilation of the student profiles collected during admission is done centrally. The students profile are also collected at each department in prescribed format, and analysed by the respective class tutors. The consolidation of reviews on student profiles reveals the following facts

- 75% of the students seeking admission in the college are girls
- Approximately 74% of the students belong to socially and economically weaker sections of the society.
- Many students excelling in fine arts, sports and games opt this college
- Students from various districts of the State and Lakshadweep also seek admission in the college.
- Every year we have applicants who are differently abled.
- Students admitted in management quota are mainly from economically backward family

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/ improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

- SC/ST
- OBC
- Women
- Differently abled

- Women
- Economically weaker sections
- Minority community
- Any other
- SC/ST

Strictly adhering to university norms, 15% of seats is reserved exclusively for SC and 5% for ST students in every discipline. SC/ST students are provided fee concession and pocket money. They are encouraged to avail various scholarships through 'egrantz' system instituted by the state government. SC/ST students aren't denied admission even if they fail to attend the interview on the date scheduled by the university and appear at a later time.

OBC

A major percentage of students in the college belong to OBC category. The SC/ST seats which remain vacant even after repeated notifications in the media are finally let open to SEBC and OBC candidates. Fee concessions and scholarships are also provided to economically backward OBC students. Short term courses on skill development are conducted utilizing the funds sanctioned by UGC under Equal Opportunity Center in Colleges.

Women

Nearly 75% students in the college are girls. Infrastructure facilities like retiring room for girls, girls friendly toilets, adequately furnished ladies hostel with mess system managed by students attract more girl students from even far off places to seek admission in the college. Diligent functioning of the women's cell and anti sexual harassment cell ensures a healthy campus atmosphere for the overall development of women students.

• Differently abled

One seat in each discipline is reserved for differently abled students. The college facilitates the procurement of all government scholarships applicable to these students. Class tutors and mentors give personal counseling to these students. Class rooms are arranged in the ground floor with easier access to washrooms. Ramp is provided in the main block. Separate and easily accessible seating arrangement provided and scribes are arranged during examinations.

Economically weaker sections

Students from economically weaker sections are exempted from paying fees at the time of admission. Student support system is an initiative of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college launched to support financially and morally the students from economically backward communities. Needy students are provided free food and stationeries. In addition to this the class tutors and mentors personally help such students financially.

• Minority community

Students belonging to minority community are admitted in considerable number every year. Coaching for entry into services and remedial teaching under UGC scheme are taken up especially for students belonging to minority community.

• Any other – outstanding achievement in sports and extracurricular activities seats in each department are reserved for students with outstanding achievements in sports and games. Students who have excelled in State and National level sports are admitted to the college with due recommendation from the Physical education department. Students who have actively participated in NCC and NSS activities at higher secondary level are given preference during admission.

Reasons for increase in demand ratio

Statistics reveals that the demand ratio has considerably increased during the previous years; this can be probably attributed to the following facts

- Transparency in admission procedure
- Strategies adopted to include students from diverse backgrounds
- Learner friendly atmosphere that prevails in the campus which is instrumental in the holistic development of an individual
- Outstanding achievement in sports and cultural activities and special training given to students
- Good performance in UGC- NET and other competitive exams
- Gradual shift in preference of students towards conventional arts and science courses

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution is very keen on providing support to differently abled students in all respects. Mentors/class tutors play a key role in identifying and addressing the issues faced by differently abled students. The teachers, non-teaching staff and students help them unconditionally. The college adopts the following measures to ensure that these students are comfortable

- Class rooms are arranged in the ground floor with easier access to washrooms.
- Ramps are constructed for easier mobility
- Separate and easily accessible seating arrangement provided for exam
- Scribes are arranged during examinations.
- Extra time allotted for writing exams as per university guidelines
- Procurement of all government scholarships applicable to these students is facilitated.
- A poetry collection in Malayalam by a differently abled student of Dept. of English has been published by Literary club of the college under the auspices of Dept. of Malayalam
- **Voice donation:** This is an initiative of central library of the college where in students read books for the visually challenged either in person or provided as audio CDs

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

40% marks in the higher secondary examination is the basic qualification required for admission to UG courses. Since rank list is prepared purely on merit basis, the candidates with the highest marks are admitted first. This ensures the adequate knowledge level of students. The institution employs strategies to assess the needs of students before the commencement of the programme.

- During the orientation programme for the freshers the Principal and IQAC interacts with the students and explains to them the vision and mission of the college and the facilities in the college for knowledge and skill development. The expectations of the students are inquired and recorded.
- During the departmental level induction programme the Heads of the departments interact with the students and explain to them the curriculum and course structure.
- The class tutor and other teachers interact with the students before the commencement of classes to discover their background, aptitude, medium of education, ambitions and areas of interests, needs and skills.
- A preliminary examination for the core courses is usually conducted at the commencement of the programme to assess the previous knowledge of the students.
- The Department of Commerce conducts a residential camp 'com-countenance' for the freshers at the commencement of every academic year to assess the students needs.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

(Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses etc)

- Based on their performance in entry level competency test conducted for the core courses, adequate remedial coaching is given to the required students after regular class hours to enable them to cope up with the programme.
- Science departments provide extra practical classes for those admitted late
- Remedial coaching is also given to selected students under Scholar Support programme (SSP)
- Proper orientation is given on the curricular requirements, methodology and pedagogical aspects of the programme. The tutorial sessions are mainly used to achieve this.
- Various clubs, NCC, NSS activities, College Union activities etc. helps to bridge the gap
- Peering teaching and group projects also helps to cope up with the programme.
- Add-on and certificate courses conducted by various departments supplement the main course
- Enrichment programmes are mainly in the form of workshops and seminars which are related to their curriculum and the recent trends in respective disciplines. Major academic enrichment programmes conducted by various departments during the last four years is tabulated below

 - Charity work at old age homes and rehabilitation centers by NCC and NSS students
 - Home for the homeless programme by NSS unit

Environment

Eco sensitization programmes

- The college nature club takes initiative to organize eco sensitization programmes such as awareness on **waste management**, clean and green campus, preservation of water, conservation of energy etc.
- **Nature club** organizes educational tours with a view to imbibe the need of protection of environment and ecological balance
- Variety of programmes is organized on June 5th **World environment day**, by different clubs of the college.
- Waste management committee comprised of teachers and students actively monitors the disposal of waste in the campus.

- **Pipe composts** are installed near every block to collect biodegradable waste. Separate bins are installed for plastic and non plastic wastes.
- NSS and NCC volunteers take initiative to clean the campus once in a month and has undertaken cleaning activities cooperating with Swach Bharath Mission
- NSS and NCC has started a green initiative in the campus by planting trees in collaboration with HDFC bank
- Institution is a partner in "Harithakeralam" programme, an initiative of the Kerala govt. to reduce, reuse and recycle waste and eradication of plastic waste
- Conducted "SWAP MELA" in collaboration with Mattannur Muncipality to collect and handover dresses and other household items to the needy
- The clubs associated with every department maintains a garden in the premises of their department
- Physics Department has conducted an energy audit and awareness programme on energy conservation (ENSAVE) in Mattannur municipality in collaboration with KSCSTE and Kerala Shasthra Sahithya Parishath
- The thrust area of research carried out in Physics department is the synthesis and characterization of eco friendly materials for photovoltaic applications using environmentally benign techniques.
- Chemistry department has also taken up an extension activity in water quality analysis of the locality
- Ozone day is observed on September 16th every year by Chemistry department and organizes various programmes to make the students aware of the risk due to ozone depletion
- A butterfly garden and vermin compost plant is maintained by the Zoology department
- Plant Science department carries out organic farming in the campus and the vegetables cultivated are distributed to college canteen, staff and students
- Rain water harvesting plants are installed in the campus with financial support from UGC
- Fund allocated in UGC 12th plan for solar power plant
- Green audit conducted at three levels-energy audit, water audit and biodiversity audit with the support of staff and students

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- The advanced learners are identified to a certain extent from their response in the classes and further by the evaluation of assignments and class tests.
- The tutorial classes are designed mainly to cater to the needs of the slow and advanced learners.
- Walk With a Scholar (WWS) programme for the advanced learners and Scholar Support Programme (SSP) for slow learners instituted by Kerala Higher Education Council are being effectively implemented in the college.
- Peer teaching arranged by advanced learners help them to improve their learning and teaching skills.
- The college enhances intellectual capability of advanced learners by involving them in research projects, presentations in seminars, quiz etc
- Motivated to apply for summer research projects offered by Indian Academy of Science

- Advanced learners are also encouraged by the tutors to appear for competitive exams and provided additional study materials and guidance.
- Interactions arranged with our alumni who are actively involved in research.
- Advanced learners promoted to appear for talent search examinations (APT-TSE) and attend training programmes conducted by various institutes and organizations (PTTS, KSCSTE).
- They are also deputed to participate in various seminars, workshops and intercollegiate competitions at the university level
- Students motivated to apply for scholarships on merit-cum-means basis
- Orientation on higher studies options provided to UG students
- Finishing school conducted for PG students
- Students motivated to do courses offered by NPTEL
- NET coaching conducted by Dept. of Commerce
- Merit fest jointly organized by IQAC and PTA

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided?)

Department level

- The data collected from the student profile and interaction between the students and tutors allow us to identify the students from poor socio-economic background.
- Analysis of the results of internal examinations help us to identify slow learners
- Mentoring and emotional support by class tutors, teachers and peer groups build the confidence of the students
- Students who miss their classes due to prolonged illness or other family problems are given special theory and practical sessions.

College level

- The Head of the Departments communicate the details of slow learners and students at the risk of drop out to the College council.
- Personal and group counseling by experts are arranged by IQAC for the weaker students
- Effective mentoring via Walk With a Scholar programme
- Regular class PTA meetings are arranged to interact with parents of these students
- **Student support system-** a joined venture of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college was launched to support financially and morally the students at the risk of dropouts. This has greatly helped to reduce the number of drop outs in the previous academic years.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

The Principal and the **Academic committee** comprising three teachers from Arts, Science and Commerce disciplines plan, monitor and evaluate the academic activities of the institution.

College Academic Calendar - It is prepared well before the commencement of the academic year. It includes the schedule of curricular, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities of the institution to be undertaken during the current academic year.

Departmental Academic Calendar - Based on the college calendar, each department prepares their departmental plan as decided in the departmental meeting. Teaching plan of all teachers is also included in the departmental plan. Teachers maintain a work diary to account all the curricular and co-curricular activities taken up.

Monitoring - Each department convenes the departmental meeting at the end of each term to evaluate the progress of the academic activities of the department. Additional working days or zero hours are utilized to compensate the lost teaching days. Portions are completed in time as per the teaching plan. Term wise report including all activities is submitted to the Academic committee. On the evaluation of the report suggestions for improvement are given by the committee.

Continuous Evaluation - The methodology and schedule of Continuous Evaluation (CE) are also included in the departmental plan. Some components of CE like internal tests, assignments etc are conducted at the departmental level and evaluated. The terminal and model examinations are conducted by the Examination cell centrally. The internal marks/grades finalized from the CE including attendance statements are monitored by the Internal Assessment Committee where the grievances of students can be redressed, if not possible at the department level. The complaints regarding the external examinations can be given directly to the University.

Academic audit: Internal academic auditing is done by IQAC at the end of every semester to ensure the quality of teaching learning and evaluation process.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC members coordinate with the teachers and make timely interventions to improve teaching learning process.

- Prepares annual plan and academic calendar
- Promotes ICT enabled teaching.

- Materials for competitive examinations, question papers of PG entrance examinations to National level institutes are also made available to the students
- Students are provided user name and password to access journals and articles from
- Students also utilize library resources to prepare assignments and do projects

Recruitment of the teachers in the college is done by the management as per the norms prescribed by the Government of Kerala, UGC and Kannur University. The selection and appointment of staff is based purely on academic credentials and performance in the interview. All vacancies are notified in national and local newspapers. The eligible candidates appear for an interview by the board constituted for the purpose and comprising, as per norms, the nominees of the State Government and the University. The candidates are expected to take a demonstration class each to prove their proficiency in teaching. Recruitment of teachers in the Community Quota is also made on the basis of pure merit.

The institution has a very conducive environment for teaching learning. The teachers enjoy academic autonomy in the adoption of mode of teaching . The institution encourages teachers to practice innovative teaching methods and also to attend enrichment and training programmes to cope up with the emerging trends in higher education.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teachinglearning process?

Yes, the institution conducts evaluation of teachers by students towards the end of every academic year using a questionnaire prepared by the IQAC. The questionnaire incorporates all the aspects required to improve teaching learning process. The consolidated evaluation sheet is provided to every teacher based on which the teacher takes up necessary measures to improve the quality of teaching.

The evaluation procedure on teacher quality, college and curriculum by the students has been automated recently. Further teachers submit a self appraisal report to the IQAC every year. Measures for improvement are suggested by IQAC. Placement is recommended by IQAC based on the analyses of self appraisal report.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college provides all the required information about the evaluation methods in advance through the college calendar/ website/ University site. Students also get more information from the respective departments regarding the pattern of questions, method of allotting marks etc. Previous years question papers are made available to the students in each department and college central library. Whenever examination reforms are introduced by the university, college conducts special orientation programmes in this regard. The internal tests are conducted on a common time table basis. Departments keep their own internal registers duly signed by the students. Hard copies of internal mark sheets signed by students are submitted to the University after uploading the same into the specific site of the University.

The new CBCSS system envisages continuous internal evaluation, conduct of internal and external examinations and timely publication of results. The introduction of Grading System and 5 point scale evaluation would help gauge the ability of teachers to set question papers in tune with the educational policy of new curriculum and their ability to switch their thinking effortlessly from marks to grades, change from traditional false number system to bar coded answer scripts system; uploading of results on university websites, reduces the chance for human errors due to many factors. Group projects on various topics and individual research projects enhance the research aptitude of students.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution and affiliating university has initiated major reforms in the field of examination when the CBCSS syllabus was introduced for the UG and the PG.

University level evaluation reforms:

- From 2014 onwards, Kannur University introduced a major change in evaluation process by shifting 5 point direct grading to 7 point indirect grading system.
- Major aspects of examination process is computerized and made online. The affiliating university website has a separate online examination link, each college is provided with separate user name and passwords.
- The admission tickets (hall tickets) of students are generated online.
- The internal marks of students are entered online.
- The answer booklets have been reduced to smart size with fixed number of pages. The answer booklets are printed with barcode technology to maintain transparency.
- The examiners are given permanent examiner code which has to be entered in the consolidated grade sheet submitted after evaluation.

College level evaluation reforms

- Conduct of timely internal examinations, periodic class tests, assignments, group level and individual level seminars, proper supervision of the project work of students.
- Online examination is introduced for I semester core papers from 2015 onwards.

- Effective clustering of students for group learning, special coaching classes for weak and backward students, student feedback on teaching and evaluation process.
- Conduct of two internal examinations per semester by the institution and the University examination at the end of each semester, both for theory and practicals
- Uploading of the internal GPA on the university website.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Internal evaluation conducted by 7 point indirect grading system.
- Conduct of centralized internal examinations.
- Timely submission of mark lists.
- Online examination for I semester core papers.
- Collection of student feedback on teaching and evaluation process.
- Uploading of the internal GPA on the University website.
- The admission tickets (hall tickets) of students for external examinations are generated online.
- Academic committee and IQAC monitor the whole process.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative assessment methods –The formative assessments approaches include internal examinations, both written and online, Open book examinations, seminars, assignments, viva- voce, field visits and projects. Based on the results of formative assessment adequate remedial teaching and tutorial classes are arranged.

Summative assessment methods –The summative assessment is carried out via University examinations in theory and practical. The formative assessment approaches and the subsequent remedial classes help the students to improve their performance in summative assessments.

Positive impacts

- Nurtures critical thinking, imagination, creativity, presentation skills, communication skills and scientific aptitude.
- Promotes independent learning of students
- Helps to assess or grade educator's level of learning in a certain period of time.
- Tends to stress what students can do rather than what they cannot.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (Weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The method and components of internal assessment are laid down by the Board of studies of Kannur University and should be followed by the institutions. The college strictly follows the structure of internal assessment designed by the university though there is flexibility in the mode of implementation.

To ensure transparency the students are informed well in advance the schedule of internal mid semester and end semester exams. Students are given sufficient time to prepare

assignments, projects and presentations. The internal marks are published and signed by the students and grievances redressed before submitting to university.

As per university curriculum specific weightage is not allotted explicitly for behavioral aspects, independent learning and communication skills though these factors implicitly decide the performance in assignment, project presentation and viva –voce.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attribute specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The vision of our institution is to excel in quality and to ensure equity in higher education. The institution adopts a holistic approach and aims at molding graduates with the following attributes

- They should have a comprehensive understanding of the society

- Should have concern for environmental sustainability
- Should be open to different kinds of opinions and positions and be able to choose between them
- They should have basic learning aptitude and desire to learn further

- Exposure to training like motivation classes, personality development sessions, counseling etc with emphasis upon development of individual qualities
- Effective implementation of teaching learning process with due emphasis on independent learning, interactive learning and collaborative learning blended with ICT enabled techniques.
- Ensuring active involvement of students in organizing sports and other co-curricular activities
- Diligent functioning of NSS and NCC units which inculcate service mentality and respect for manual labor among students

College Level: The internal assessment marks of the students are published by each department before they are submitted to the University. If the students have any complaints they will approach department heads/tutors. If necessary the complaints are forwarded to the Internal Assessment Committee for further action. If the complaints are unaddressed at the department, the students can directly register complaints at the Grievance Reddressal cell functioning in the college

University Level: After the announcement of results, if the student is not satisfied with the grades obtained, he has the option of verifying photocopy of answer scripts and then appeal for revaluation.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

Yes. The college has clearly stated outcome in all academic and co curricular activities in the college. - The entry and exit level assessments reveals the learners overall development.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

• autonomy to the principal investigator:

Autonomy is accorded to the Principal Investigator with respect to the conduct of research; in the selection of topic, utilization of funds and appointment of research fellows etc.

• timely availability or release of resources:

The college maintains regular communication with the funding agencies and it is ensured that the information flows down to the targeted group without any delay. The administrative staffs are directed to stream line the process and procedures to avoid delay in releasing fund.

• adequate infrastructure and human resources:

The college is always keen to provide all sorts of facilities for research scholars to carry out research work and to faculty who undertake minor/major projects. The management supports the infrastructure development of the laboratories using overhead charges.

• time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:

No relaxation is given to teachers from engaging classes or in teaching hours for undertaking research. They have to carry out such initiatives beyond normal working hours. But the college offers flexibility in the schedule of work so as to enable them to complete the projects in time. Teachers availing FDP facility granted by UGC can make use of leave with pay for completing the doctoral degree.

• support in terms of technology and information needs:

We support the researchers with free internet in all departments and Wi-Fi in college computer centre. Central library provide access to Books, Journals and e-resources.

• facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:

The administrative staffs of the college take initiative to maintain proper accounts. They are periodically audited by an external reputed agency and utilization certificates are submitted in time.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college spends an appreciable amount for the development of infrastructure for research such as purchasing books for the library, subscribing research journals, installing internet facility, providing access to e-resources through N-LIST etc. though no separate fund is allotted for research.

The laboratories are frequently upgraded with necessary instruments to improve the research facilities.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The college has no provision to provide seed money for research. In fact, faculty members are eligible for financial assistance under the Faculty Development Programme of UGC.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

- Financial assistance from the KSCSTE and the University, are being made available to the research students in the Research Departments of the Institution.
- Research culture among students is ensured by facilitating participation of students in research and related activities.
- The teachers also support the students to carry out their project work. No financial support is provided by the college to the students for undergoing projects. However, the Departments provide internet facility, reference books and proper guidance for carrying out projects taken up by the UG and PG students, as part of their curriculum.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking interdisciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

- The expertise of the Departments of Commerce and Economics are exchanged while the students are undertaking research projects.
- The students of the Department of Physics and Chemistry interact in subjects common to both departments. The departments are planning to apply for an interdisciplinary project to UGC.
- The Department of Zoology and Botany jointly engaged in the preparation of Campus Biodiversity Register.

- With an intention to promote research culture among the staff and students, the college takes the initiative to provide library facilities, beyond the working hours of the college with latest edition of books and standard journals.

- Students could achieve improvement in organizing ability, team spirit and leadership quality which is apparent from their deeds.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The college provides an orientation to the newly appointed teachers and to the first year degree and PG students to familiarize them with the facilities and opportunities available to them in the college. IQAC of the college takes the initiative to conduct the orientation programme. All departments are allotted with a specified amount from the PTA fund to meet the expenditure incurred for the extension activities. Specific actions in this regard are:

- Students are encouraged to enrol in NSS and NCC when they are admitted to first year degree programme, on a particular day which is decided at the beginning of the year as mentioned in the teachers diary.
- The charge of NSS units and NCC unit are assigned to the faculty members on rotation basis.
- Institution provides required infrastructure facilities and also allows the faculty to plan and execute independently.
- NSS/NCC camps are organized without hindering the academic schedule.
- Certificates of merit are issued to the students who participate in NSS and NCC programmes and they are eligible for grace marks in the University examination.
- Grace marks are allowed to the students participated in NCC and NSS programmes while they are admitted to degree and PG courses.
- The performance of students and teachers are recognized by the University by providing rewards/awards for outstanding performance.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The institution has an efficient tutorial system, where the teacher in charge of every class simultaneously acts as a tutor, mentor and counsellor. Every first semester student has to submit a data sheet filled with all his/her whereabouts which includes their parent's education, occupation, annual income etc. The tutor prepare the socio-economic status of students which itself reveal the underprivileged and vulnerable among the student community. Deserving students are given supports like Student Support System (provide food, cloth and books as per their requirements), arrangements for government scholarships and support from NSS like "Home for a homeless classmate" etc.

The college undertakes varied extension activities and NSS and NCC programmes, for the overall development of students. By involving in extension activities and by working with

A sense of sympathy and empathy towards less privileged class of people could be developed. Awareness about social issues could also be attained by the students.

Mattannur Municipality in association with the Department of History, organized Local History Writing Workshop and being a major programme for the current academic year it could invite public attention in the activities of the institution. The programme is a comprehensive and lengthy exercise to record the annals of the Mattannur's past. The initiative to organize such a programme came from the office bearers of the Mattannur Municipal Council. The intention of the programme is to document the past through which the present Mattannur has formed.

Special areas like agrarian sector, development of transportation, jenmi system in the region, Pazhassi Rebellion and Mattannur, British interventions in Mattannur, evolution of local bodies through the ages etc., are being elaborately interrogated as part of the local history of Mattannur. The programme was officially launched in September 2016 and around 12 meetings were held so far. The local history workshop sessions were handled by eminent historians like Prof.K.K.N.Kurup, Dr. P.J.Vincent etc. Under their instructions students were divided into ten groups and they have collected information from elders by means of field visit, interview etc. This project provided an opportunity for the students to get some exposure in academic research as well as writing. The final report of the local history will be brought out soon.

- IQAC prepares Infrastructure Master Plan and submitted to the Management.
- The engineering wing of the Head Office prepares the estimate and submits before the Executive Council for approval.
- Approval is accorded on priority basis and the execution is directly by the Management, supervised by the College Development Committee.

During the last five years attempts have been made to facilitate effective teaching and learning by the enhancement of infrastructure like:

- De-asbestose old blocks with GI sheets.
- Construction of 9 classrooms to accommodate the newly started programmes
- Construction of Ladies hostel completed and started functioning.
- Construction of more number of lady's toilets.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? The college has augmented its infrastructure to keep pace with academic advancement and institutional growth. The college management is the authority to make construction and renovations on the campus in accordance with the decision taken by the Executive Council of NSS. Some of the facilities developed by the college during the last four years are mentioned below.

- Constructed nine new class rooms to accommodate the students of newly introduced courses M Sc Mathematics and B Sc Plant Science.
- Construction of six new ladies toilets
- Steel grill fitted at the entrance
- Seminar hall constructed in the first floor of administrative block with audio video facilities.
- Two Rainwater harvest tanks (each with 1 Lakh litter capacity) constructed with UGC fund to meet the water scarcity during summer season.
- One smart class room has been set to run classes for ASAP foundation course and other important ICT teaching learning requirements.
- A cabin for security person has been constructed adjacent to main gate.
- A handball and Kho-Kho courts were constructed adjacent to the main playground.
- A vermin compost tank was implemented by the Department of Zoology for organic waste management.
- Replaced all asbestos sheets with GI sheets and most of the class rooms are protected from heat with false ceiling.
- A diesel generator of 50 KVA has been installed to meet the requirements of the college
- Special ramps have been made for the differently abled students in the main part of the building.
- The laboratories are upgraded by procuring additional instruments
- Installation of safe and cool drinking water units in all blocks

 LCD Projector is installed in seminar halls, smart classrooms, PG classes and in science laboratories.

Now we have only two physically challenged students in our college. The institution is aware of the special needs of such students. Special ramp has been made for the differently abled students in administrative block. We also provide the assistance of scribe during University examinations. The institution is ready to provide facilities, if more students are enrolled.

- Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga centre, etc.: A 12 station multi gymnasium is installed in the men's hostel. Yoga and aerobic training is conducted in the auditorium.
- Computer facility including access to internet in hostel: The college hostel doesn't have separate computer and internet facility. Since the hostel is located very near to the campus, the inmates make use the college computer lab for various purposes.
- Internet and Wi-Fi facility: There is no Wi-Fi facility in the hostel. Internet is provided with computer centre.
- **Facilities for medical emergencies:** Medical facility has been made available in the health centre. During emergencies we approach nearest hospital for medical aid.
- Library facility in the hostels: Hostel doesn't have separate library. We provide newspaper for inmates.
- Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy: There is no separate residential facility for the staff. They are permitted to occupy the hostels.
- Constant supply of safe drinking water: The college has its own system of water supply to the whole establishment including college, hostels and canteen. The college has built two separate rainwater harvesting tank each having 1 lakh litre capacity to use in emergency. The college maintains a pond and a well nearby to pump water for daily use. Water purifiers are installed in every block for drinking water.
- **Security:** The college has round the clock security in the campus including its hostels. A security's cabin has constructed near the college gate. Principals cabin, office room, veranda and office entrance are under CCTV surveillance.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college gives great importance to the physical and mental well being of its staff and students. Provisions made available for health care are:

- Health centre.
- First aid facility in Women's cell and some departments.
- Water purifiers for safe drinking water.
- Yoga and aerobic training for students and staff.
- NSS, NCC and various departments organise blood group detection/donation camp.
- Health awareness programmes conducted by Department of Zoology and NSS.
- Free eye and kidney disease detection camps conducted by NSS.
- Cancer detection camp conducted by Vanithavedi for the public.

All the above mentioned units are actively working in the college. Separate rooms are arranged for most of the units and some of the units are attached to departments of the concerned coordinator. The details of such facilities are as follows.

- **IQAC:** A well furnished IQAC room with computer, printer, internet and mounted LCD Projector for meetings and digital presentations.
- **Grievance Redressal Cell:** No separate room is allotted. They use seminar hall or student's union room on requirement.
- Women's Cell: A room with a cot and first aid facility is provided.
- Counselling and Career Guidance & Placement Unit: Career guidance cell has separate room and placement cell also functions there.
- **Health Centre:** College health centre is attached with the Department of Physical Education
- Canteen: A well furnished and spacious canteen with separate space for students and staff.
- Recreational spaces for staff and students: There is no separate space earmarked for recreational activities.
- Safe drinking water facility: The College maintains one big pond and a nearby well for pumping water for daily use. Water purifiers are also provided in all blocks for drinking water. Two Rainwater harvesting tanks each with 1Lakh litter capacity is functioning in the campus.
- **Auditorium:** An indoor auditorium with 200 sitting capacity and an open air auditorium are in the campus to host various programmes.

4.2. Library as a learning resource

4.2.1 Does the library have an advisory committee? Specify the composition of the committee. What significant initiatives have been taken by the committee to render the library student/user friendly?

Yes. There is a library advisory committee (LAC) in our college which consists of eight members, Principal as the Chairman and Librarian as the Secretary. The other five members are the heads from various departments. The Committee reconstitutes every year on rotation basis. One student representative is nominated by the Principal. LAC serves as a monitoring body by giving proper direction timely on library matters to improve the existing facilities

and services offered from the library. LAC takes decisions on all matters including procurement of books and journals, budget proposal, analysing the feedback given by the teachers, students and staff etc. Some of the most important decisions taken by LAC are given here.

Significant initiatives implemented by the committee are as follows:

- Initiatives to develop department libraries by providing more collections from the central library.
- Increased the number of books that can be taken by students at a time.
 - I DC -1 to 2 books
 - III DC-2 to 3 books
 - PG-5 to 8 books
- Organise internal book exhibitions to introduce new books and promote reading habits among students.
- Steps taken to conduct different competitions like elocution, essay writing etc to develop talents of students.
- "Semester wise Series Quiz programme" started under "Book Club" as a more effective method for imparting current information
- Library changed its closing time from 5.00 pm to 5.30 pm for the convenience of students especially hostel inmates.
- Decided to give wide awareness among students on how to use N-LIST and other electronic resources.
- To start giving book binding training for students and offered remuneration for their work to the library as a savings bank deposit at college post office.
- To start certificate course on computer hardware maintenance & networking for students those who interested in computer related courses and plan to equip them as a team for giving timely service to the system requirements of the college.
- To launch Inter Library Loan system in the Central Library of the college in association with Municipal library, Mattannur.
- To conduct a socio-economic survey among SC/ST students to understand the challenges they face that can adversely affect their education and to move towards the formation of "SC/ST Development Cell"
- Set up an "Inspirational books' collection" in the library to motivate students to frame their aim and attain them through hard work and firm determination. Apart from that it would help students to fix their goal through value based thinking and approach and become good human being and committed citizens to the society and the mother country.
- Purchase of resources for coaching for entry in services.



Circulation of books, reference service, Inter Library Loan, Current Awareness Service, display of important information, browsing facility, e-resource access, reprography, printing etc are the major services offered from the library. Some special services we provide on specific request like document delivery from other institutions, reading service for visually challenged.

- **Manuscripts:** Available in the Department of History as part of Pazhassi archives.
- **Reference:** We have a good collection of references like Encyclopaedias, Dictionaries, Yearbooks, Competitive examination books like UGC-NET, GATE, MAT, CAT, MCA, MBA, Civil Services, Banking, Railway, Defence services etc
- **Reprography:** Available
- ILL (Inter Library Loan service): Available. The college Library has made an ILL agreement with Municipal Library, Mattanur to borrow 100 books from there once in three months and distribute among our students. A three tier student chain running this system in an effective way as the college union chairman as the coordinator of the programme through which he gives 10 books to each department student representatives and these little librarians distribute books among students in their own departments. After a specific period of internal distribution, each little librarian handover his/her book to the little librarian from other department and vice versa. The College union chairman takes a leading role to run the student driven reading system successfully. He examines the issue/ return register handled by 10 little librarians every week and inform College Librarian about the current position of the system.
 - In addition to that more than 100 students acquired membership in Municipal Library also who consider reading as a passion.
 - As part of ILL co-operation with Municipal Library, we conducted several programmes within college for both students and public.

- Conducted ONV Commemoration Talk (in memory of ONV Kurup, renowned malayalam poet, won Jnanapeetam, Padmavibhooshan etc who passed away in February 2016) as part of implementing ILL phase-II
- A plan is laid down to conduct a book exhibition to familiarise newly released books by notable publishers.
- Information Deployment and Notification: As part of Current Awareness Services (CAS), we conduct semester-wise series quiz programme for students every week and provide enough materials to make them aware of current events. CAS is being conducted under "Book Club". In addition to that library displays current matters and S&T innovations useful for students on each subject on the notice board.
- **Download**: Available
- **Printing:** Available
- **Reading List/Bibliography compilation:** Not available. We display recently added titles to the library on the notice board.
- In-house/remote access to e-resources: Available
- User orientation and awareness: We conduct user orientation and awareness programmes for freshers in each department as soon as they joined as members to the library. Students ask to come to the library at lunch break and utilize this time to make them aware of library resources both tangible and electronic forms, rules, special services like Document delivery service for full-text research articles, Inter Library Loan(ILL), Current Awareness Service (CAS), Book club activities etc.
- Assistance in searching databases: We give awareness about usage of OPAC and online resource access when they come to the library for the first time. Provide further assistance also when need arise.
- **INFLIBNET/IUC facilities**: Available (N-LIST). This facility is being provided to the students and teachers.

The present location of the library is not so approachable for physically challenged users. The Library provide special services to visually challenged students in and outside the campus and public, the details are given as follows

- This is a special service given to blind students on their specific request. One of our students read nearly 1000 pages of NET exam guide book in Political science for a blind PG student from outside the campus.
- General book reading: The UGC Librarian (Central library) and an Assistant professor of the Department of Hindi are constant readers of DAISY voice donation project for blinds.

Yes. The library collects feedback from its users on yearly basis and all suggestions and comments made by the users are discussed with the LAC and on the basis of that step taken to improve existing services and facilities.

- Mode of feedback: There are two methods to get feedback from users.
 - Online feedback: This is mainly intended for students to collect their level of satisfaction about library facilities, collections, services and other related matters. Online feedback is conducted once in a year.
 - Suggestions box: This facility provides more freedom to scribble on any specific matters that not covered in the above questionnaire. Any stakeholders irrespective of students, faculties and staff can utilize this mode of feedback at any time.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The college gives special care for the establishment and upgrading of IT facilities. A trained temporary staff is appointed in the Computer centre.

- Most of the IT based work (online registration, project works, ASAP foundation skill practical classes, ASAP summer skill practical classes etc.) has been undertaken by this centre.
- The systems and the power units (UPS) are maintained & upgraded.
- LCD projector has been mounted in 4 class rooms/labs/seminar hall/indoor auditorium for ICT enabled teaching.
- The fund received from UGC and PD has been proportionately distributed to all departments to purchase the equipment according to their needs.
- The college has upgraded the PCs with latest configuration.
- Smart class room is equipped with LCD projector, computer with internet connection, Audio-visual aids for creating environment for ICT enabled teaching-learning.
- INFLIBNET facility is provided by the Library
- Nearly 70 students and few teachers have registered for NPTEL course offered by MHRD and seven of them successfully completed the course.

- The college alumni association awards Rs.500 to one student in each discipline as a financial assistance from 2007-08 onwards.
- PTA presents a cash award Rs.1000 to one meritorious student in each discipline as an encouragement for academic achievements.
- The Student Support System- Majority of students in our college belongs to economically and socially backward sections of the society. To cater to their financial needs the college has initiated a unique venture, the Student Support Programme, which ultimately aims at the welfare of the student community as a whole. The financial contribution from the staff of the college is used to implement the program. Financial assistance is provided for payment of fees, purchase of books and other study materials, dress, bus fare and other essentials. Aid is extended also in the form of concessional rates for food in college canteen.

9. Publication of student magazines

1. Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

- Seats are reserved for SC/ST and OBC candidates seeking admission for various courses in the college, as per the rules and regulations of the Government.
- Financial support in the form of scholarships is made available to students.
- Remedial coaching programmeof UGC aimed at giving additional academic support to students belonging to socially and economically backward sections,
- Coaching for Entry in Services Programme focuses on giving special training to students belonging to minorities and socially and economic backward categories.

2. Students with physical disabilities

- Adequate infrastructural facilities are arranged for students with physical disabilities. Classes for such students are always arranged in the ground floor considering their special needs.
- A ramp is constructed near Principal's office to ease the difficulties faced by the physically challenged persons.
- Assistance of scribe is provided for physically challenged students for attending University exams. Comfortable seating arrangements are made as per requirements of students.
- Additional time is given for eligible students as per university rules.
- The emotional and social needs of such students are given special attention in tutorial sessions and personal counselling sessions are arranged.

3. Overseas students

At present the college has no overseas student.

4. Students to participate in various competitions

The college wholeheartedly encourages participation of the students in competitions organised by various agencies.

- 'Arangu', the arts forum of the college has envisioned the holistic development of latent artistic talents of students of our college. It also aims at providing quality training to students so that they can give performance of superior quality.
- A five day National workshop, 'SAPARYA' on five different art forms (Kathak, Kathakali, Kuchupudi, Tholpaavakkothu and Koodiyattam) was conducted in collaboration with SPICMACAY to nurture the latent talents in students,
- Appropriate guidance and financial assistance is provided to students toregister for the various competitions at the University and Interuniversity levels through proper channel.
- The attendance for the day in which they participate in a competition is granted to them.
- Department clubs also promote student talents by organizing various programmes and informing students about intercollegiate competitions (quiz/debates/colloquiums/presentations) organized by other institutions and organizations.
- The Students Union organizes annual cultural programme 'Swaralaya'. Union coordinates activities related to Kannur University Union Youthfestival.

Promotion of sports activities

The Physical Education Department leads all the activities related to the promotion of sports activities of students.

- The students coming under sports quota are given all the facilities in capacity of the college to enhance their level of achievement.
- The department informs students about the various competitions organised by Kannur University and other interstate/interuniversity/intercollegiate competitions.

- Training sessions and workshops on Yoga, aerobics and Kalarippayattu are conducted by the department.
- The department selects students to represent in various sports events.
- The department conducts an annual sports meet to instil the spirit of sportsmanship in the college community.
- Monetary support is given to members participating in various tournaments, both interstate and intra state.
- The college has appointed a coach for the Volleyball team in our college.
- Accommodation for students is provided in the sports hostel within the campus.
- Special diet as per requirement is provided to the students by Kerala State Sports Council.

5. Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

- Though the college lacks the facility of a full-fledgedhealth centre, provision for first aid is arranged in the college. The department of Physical Education attends to first aid needs of students. First aid box is kept in Zoology department also.
- In case of emergency situations external medical facilities are arranged, which is available within half akilometre from the college.
- Timely interventions are made to create health awareness in students such as an eye check up camp organised at the college by NSS and Zoology department in collaboration with Al-Salama Eye Hospital and VASAN Eye Care respectively.

6. Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- The Coaching for Entry in Services Programme funded by UGC gives free coaching classes to students belonging to minority communities to prepare them to face competitive exams conducted by governmental and banking organisations. Expert faculties are invited to engage classes for the programme.
- Mathematics department conducted PSC coaching programmes for students of the college aiming at developing mathematical problem solving skills.
- PG department of Commerce and PG department of Mathematics have conducted coaching programmes for the students appearing for UGC-NET examinations.

7. Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)

- The college is a training partner in the ASAP programme launched by the Higher Education Council of Govt. of Kerala. The Department of English has successfully completed the programme twice and many of the students trained in the programme are employed as language trainers.
- The certificate courses conducted by various departments emphasise additional skill development in students. The courses offered are
 - Certificate course in Basic Computational skills and Graphics
 - Certificate course in Introduction to Latex, a technical documentation tool
 - Certificate Course in Mushroom Cultivation
 - Certificate course in Human Rights Education
 - Certificate course in Photography
 - Certificate course in Accounting and Taxation.
 - Certificate Course in Classical Dance: Theory and Practice
 - Certificate course in Hindi Translation
 - Certificate course in DTP
 - Certificate course in Spoken Hindi
 - Certificate course on Computer Hardware Maintenance and Networking
- Equal opportunity centre conducted spoken English classes for students for developing communication skills in students.

- All students are required to create e-mail accounts when they join for the Degree Programme.
- On-line examinations are conducted for continuous assessmet to make the students familiar with the process, which is now widely used in higher education.
- Students are encouraged to do online courses offered by agencies such as NPTEL.

8. Support for "slow learners"

- The college is a partner in conducting the Scholar Support Programme, which is a part of the 'New Initiatives in Higher Education' initiated by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Kerala. SSP aims at imparting additional support to students who are weak in curricular areas. The subjects in which additional curricular support would be offered have been selected on the basis of result analysis. Students selected for the programme attend special coaching programmes and are provided with additional study materials.
- Peer tutoringis arranged at departmental and interdepartmental level.
- The remedial coaching programme funded by UGC envisioned to enhance the academic levels of backward students. Special timetable for academic assistance was designed for the programme.
- Individual attention is given to slow learners. Specific difficulties identified at individual level are attended to by arranging counselling sessions and by giving additional academic support by teachers.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business

Most of our students are coming from rural background and many belong to socioeconomically backward sections of the society who rarely get chances of exposure to higher areas of learning and interaction. Focussing on vertical mobility of students and diversity of learning experience, various departments plan programmes so that students get exposure to institutes of higher learning...

- Students of Department of Physics visited and interacted with faculty of the centre for Nanoscience Engineering and IISc. They visited Vishveshwarayyascience museum. A final year student of the department attended a training programme, PTTS, at Regional Institute of Education, Mysore. Three students participated in a workshop at RamanujaInsititute, Kottayam.
- Department of Chemistry conduct academic visits to institutions of industrial importance. Students visited the Malabar Cements at Palakkad and silk factories in Mysore.
- Annual study tours focus on visits to National Institutes of Research, Protected areas and Museums so that students get maximum exposure to diverging areas of research as well as conservation techniques. As part of study tour, Department of Zoology visited CMFRI, a premier research institute in Biological Sciences
- As part of the field study, the Department of Botany conducted a field trip to KFRI, a premier research institute in Kerala.
- The students of department of Economics visited tea factory in Munnar
- A motivational visit to IIT Chennai was conducted for the scholars as part of WWS programme.
- PG Department of Commerce has given diverse experience to students by exposing them to the modern trends in their discipline.
 - Aseminar onfinancial literacy was conducted in collaboration with Geojit BNP **Paribas**

- o A seminar on Indian and International courses was organised in association with Logic School of Management Kochi.
- o A seminar on corporate relationswas conducted by inviting experts from NITTE Bangalore.
- Seminar on Professional courses, certified management accounting and international financial reporting standards were conducted

In addition to this, departments have undertaken various projects and done programmes to develop such skills in students.

- The Department of Zoology gave hands-on-training in Apiculture and Vermicomposting.
- The Department of Botany gave training to students on Mushroom cultivation. The Department developed an organic vegetable farm in the college campus. The certificate course on Mushroom Cultivation offered by the department intends to develop entrepreneurial skills in students.
- The Women's cell in the college organised a variety of programmes with a mission of earning while learning. Students were given hands on training in umbrella making, tailoring, jewellery designing, production of toiletries, pickling etc.
- Workshop on Book binding wasconducted by the Central Library. The skills of the trained students were used in binding damaged books in the college library. This helped the students to earn while they learn.
- The certificate course in Photography offered by department of English also aims the development of entrepreneurial skills in students.
- The computer lab in the college offers certificate course in Hardware maintenance to students.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and cocurricular activities such as sports, games, Ouiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

Excellence in quality can be attained only through the holistic development of the students. The college demands and encourages the active participation of students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

- Departmental clubs functioning in all the departments design and implement divergent activities, both curricular and co-curricular ensuring participation of all the students. Such activities provide them a platform to express their talents.
- The college has active units of NCC and NSS giving leadership to co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Sports & Games:

Department of Physical Education is a centre for moulding intellectually enriched, emotionally balanced and physically strong young men and women. Infrastructural facilities are arranged for supporting students participating in District, University and State level competitions. An annual sport meet is conducted ensuring participation of the whole college community. University level tournaments are also hosted by the institution

Physical facilities available in the Campus for sports and games are

Special training

- The Department of Physical Education provide coaching camp to the selected players in major games like Softball, Football, Cricket, Hand ball, Shuttle badminton, Chess, Kabaddi, Khokho and Athletics.
- Sports hostel (Volleyball men) in college is aided by Kerala State Sports Council.
- The council provide volleyball coach to train the sports hostel players.
- Coaching is given to college team for participating in University intercollegiate tournaments.
- They have separate training schedule and practice time of the students is fixed as 6.30 to 9 in the morning and 4.30 to 6.30 in the evening
- The council meet the boarding and lodging charges and washing allowance of sports hostel players..

Arts & Cultural activities:

- A well organized Arts Forum 'Arangu' is functioning in the college to promote creative talents among the students. A team of teachers is entrusted with the charge of coordinating arts and cultural activities.5 days National Workhop on Indian classical and Folk Art Forms was arranged in collaboration with SPICMACAY in which nearly 300 students of the institution participated
- Various cultural activities such as Fine Arts Festival (Swaralaya), College Day Celebrations, Departmental Association programmes and programmes organized by the College Union ignite the talents among the students.
- The artistic talent of selected students are promoted by intensive training in various art forms by with the assistance of experts concerned.
- Celebration of festivals such as Onam and Christmas by the college community every year by organising various programmes in the college enriches the cultural activities of the college.

Debate, Quiz, Discussion

Various Departments in the college conduct debates, quiz and open forums independently and also in association with variousexternal agencies and organizations. These programmes provide opportunities for students to express their views and ideas and sharpen their intellect. The academic seminars, colloquiums and workshops also offer a platform for presentations, debates and discussions.

*Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations

- Examination oriented special programmes like stress management sessions, motivational sessions, discussions, special classes, counselling programmes and model examinations are conducted in the college.
- Special projects like 'Walk with a Scholar', 'Scholar Support Programme'
- 'Additional Skill Acquisition Programme' and remedial coaching programme are also

implemented in the college.

• Additional academic support to those students participating in various competitions is given informally in the form of extra classes for those who miss the class while participating in various competitions. They are allowed to appear for internal exams with a schedule suitable for them.

• Financial support to sports hostel students

The selected players from Kerala Sports council get admission to the sports hostel. They also get Rs.200 per head per day as food and accommodation charges, and also provide Rs. 100 per month as washing allowance.

• Diet

Kerala State Sports Council has provided separate menu (Food) for sports hostel students.Refreshments are provided during practice sessions.

Regular upgrading of sports equipments is done using the funds elicited from both the UGC and the Department of Collegiate Education.

• Financial support to other sports students

All the teams are paid TA/DA for participating in Practice matches and University intercollegiate tournaments.

(TA-Actual Bus/Train (Second Class) Fare, DA-Rs. 50.00 Per day,Room Rent-Rs. 50.00 Per day,Incidental Expense -Rs. 25.00)

Uniforms& sports equipment

- Free sports kit and uniform are provided to all the selected team members for participating in University intercollegiate tournaments.

- Seminars / symposiums/colloquiums conducted by the college.
- Training is given to face various competitive examinations and entranceexaminations.
- Study materials and books and internet facility made available to the students to prepare for competitive exams.
- The Coaching for Entry in Services Programme provides free coaching for students, equipping them with techniques to face various competitive examinations. The programme aims at providing coaching facilities ensuring equitability and social justice.
- College calendar is a repository of information regarding the higher studies opportunities.
- The Career Guidance Cell makes the students aware of the various job positions available for them.
- Students are promoted to appear for campus selection conducted by various agencies.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The institution is one among the 17 Arts and Science colleges managed by the Nair Service Society (NSS), a prominent educational agency in Kerala founded by Padmabhooshan Sri. Mannathu Padmanabhan. The Management, Principal and faculty play pivotal role in the design and implementation of quality policy and plans.

- At the top management level we have The NSS Executive Council headed by the
 General Secretary at the apex and is the main decision making body. The NSS
 Colleges Central Committee which functions under NSS Executive Council
 monitors the academic and non-academic activities of the institution. The manager
 summons meeting of Principals twice a year to plan and implement the policies for
 quality enhancement and infrastructural development of the institutions.
- At the local level, college has a Development Committee, constituting representatives of N S S Directors Board, N S S Taluk Union President, Principal and prominent personalities of the society to monitor the infrastructural development of the college.
- At the institutional level, the college council comprises of the Principal, HODs of various departments, teachers' representatives, Superintendent of the administrative office and Librarian meets to plan and review the regular functioning of the college. The decisions taken by the top management committee are executed by the Principal after discussions and approval of the college council.
- The college IQAC plays a pivotal role in framing the policies with the help of management representatives and other external members. IQAC sets the quality bench marks and ensures the quality of all curricular and co-curricular activities in the college.
- Faculty meetings are conducted to discuss academic matters and issues related to administration. Implementation of new policies is executed with the cooperation of HODs, faculty members and non-teaching staff.
- The suggestions of Student council consisting of staff advisors and college union representatives and the student IQAC are taken into consideration while framing and modifying policies.

The NSS management has a well structured educational system and plan with a long term vision in enhancing the quality of the educational institutions under its management. The management offerstimely support and guidance to the Principal for the smooth functioning of the institution. The Principal with the approval of the college council incorporates the plans into the institutional plan. Major responsibility to implement those plans is entrusted to the HODs who execute them with the cooperation of members of the department.

• Interaction with stakeholders

The college has a cordial relationship with all stakeholders - parents, alumni and the society. Various interactive programmes under the leadership of management and the Principal

include,

- Induction programme conducted by IQAC for the freshers to aquaint them withinstitutional vision and mission and the facilities in the campus.
- The PTA acts as an advisory body and intervevnes in every activity of the institution. The PTA general body meeting is convened once and class-wise PTA meetings are held twice in an academic year.
- The departments conduct regular alumni meetings and distinguished alumni are invited to interact with the students.
- Annual planning and evaluation meetings of the faculty are conducted
- Regular IQAC meetings are convened
- Extension activities are taken up by all the departments as a part of institutional social responsibility.

• Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

- The need assessment is done by the periodic sitting of various committees in the college like Purchase committee, Library committee, Instrument maintenance committee, Hostel committee, Research cell, Student council, Faculty council and Administrative council.
- Every year student feedback is taken on various criteria related to institution, department, curriculum and teacher. The analysis of student feedback forms the basis of future plans.
- The IQAC interacts with the students, faculty and parents and their needs and aspirations are given priority in policy formulation and implementation.

Some of the prominent resolutions taken up on the basis of need assessment are the posting of Computer tutor, temporary lab staffs, fund allotment to instrumentation maintenance etc.

• Reinforcing the culture of excellence & champion organizational change

To reinforce the culture of excellence and champion organizational change, the policy statements and action plans are formulated based on feedback from the stakeholders. Management always takes keen interest to improve the physical facilities of the college. The Principal and the staff members cater to the implementation of each and every aspect of the strategy by introducing following reforms,

- Infrastructural reforms
- Teaching learning reforms.
- Innovative programmes for the holistic development of students under various clubs and forums.
- Practices to upholdenvironmental consciousness among stakeholders

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution adopts various procedures to monitor and evaluate its policies and plans for effective implementation and improvement from time to time. The most effective ones are the periodic evaluations and reviews conducted at various levels and by different bodies:

- Principals meeting with the Management.
- IQAC meeting.
- College academic council meetings.
- Periodic meetings of various committees like, UGC cell, research cell, library committee, planning board, infrastructure committee etc.
- Interaction with the stakeholders like students, parents and alumni.

Feedback from stakeholders.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

- The NSS is a corporate management taking lead role in promoting the aided sector in education thereby supporting the society and their educational requirements. The management is playing a pivotal role in formulating the higher education policies of the state throughnegotiations with political parties and government.
- The college level academic exercises are properly guided and monitored by NSS Colleges' Central Committee under the leadership of efficient and experienced academicians and administrators.
- Principals' conferences, college level academic interactions, visits and meetings of staff organizations are periodically convened to assess the activities of colleges.
- Proper communicationis given to activate the academic and administrative processes and feedbacks are taken for assessment.
- Performance of the departments and results are analyzed and necessary instructions are given for improvement. Matching grants are being given to meet the contingencies.
- The IQAC including management representative plays a key role in formulating and implementing quality enhancement measures.
- The management promotes the research activities of teachers. The faculty is encouraged to avail FIP, participate in orientation programme, refresher courses, seminars, workshops etc.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- NSS Colleges' Central Committee functions under the NSS Executive Council headed by the General Secretary, who is a renowned leader and social reformer.
- Principal leads the institution with the assistance of College Council.
- The HOD's take a lead role in the administration of the department.
- Each faculty is in charge of a class and act as a mentor of that class.
- Various clubs and forums functioning under the auspices of the department are ledby student coordinators.
- The College Union and Department Association activities are undertaken by the elected student representatives under the guidance of teachers.
- The college office is administered by the superintendent.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The delegation of authority and provision of operational autonomy are implemented by decentralizing the governance.

Academic Decentralization: The college council frames academic policies and programmes based on the existing rules and regulations. The council nominates the members to various committees. The important committees are Academic committee, Research cell, Library advisory committee, Tutorial committee and the Internal assessment committee. The Academic committee designs the college academic calendar and also schedules the curricular activities. Departments prepare departmental calendar in tune with the college calendar. Academic committee carries out periodic review of the activities and the report is submitted to the Principal along

with the recommendations and suggestions. Committees are also functioning to carry out different co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The system mobilizes and exploits individual and collective potentialities to improve the quality of education.

- Administrative Decentralization: The Principal is the administrative head of the institution and monitors the administrative work. The office is headed by a Senior Superintendent under whom the head accountant, clerks, typists and last grade staff are functioning. The college council also advises the principal in carrying out different administrative works. Permanent committees like Grievance redressel cell, Election committee, Admission committee, Anti-ragging and ethics committee, Discipline and Student Affairs committee and Purchase committee supports the administrative functioning.
- **Finance decentralization:** Financial sources to the college are from The Kerala Govt., UGC, University, NSS management and college level organizations like PTA, Alumni association. Principal is wholly responsible in sanctioning and utilizing the funds and sharing of powers in this regard is limited. However for the utilization of funds other than salary and examination, the advice of the council, IQAC, purchase committee and infra structural committee is taken in to account.

Funds of the PTA and Alumni associations are utilized only with the concurrence of respective executive committees. Laboratory funds are used as per the recommendations of the HODs. The library funds are used as per the directions of Library advisory committee. The UGC funds are utilized as per the guidelines of UGC, recommendations of the council and by the approval of the Planning Board.

Budgets are prepared for Govt. accounts and management accounts separately by the Principals office and forwarded to the office of the Deputy Director of Collegiate Education and the management respectively.

The parents, alumni and teachers support the college to improve the quality of educational provisions. PTA fund is collected at the time of admission and is used for improving the infrastructure and to support academic activities. Alumni support the infrastructural developments and co-curricular activities

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

- Participative management is promoted at all levels. The NSS management gives functional autonomy to the institution.
- The Management Council, Academic Council, Faculty Council and Student Council ensure that the students and the faculty are constantly involved in the day today functioning of the institution.
- In the existing situation Principal is the primary authority controlling the academic and administrative matters.
- Principal delegates duties and responsibilities to HODs and to various committees for the effective execution of work.
- IQAC does the planning and evaluation for the college.
- Co-curricular and extracurricular activities are coordinated autonomously by the faculty members with the assistance of the student representatives, in consultation with the Principal.
- The Principal convenes meeting of teaching/non-teaching/students union/PTA/alumni etc. Their views and opinions are taken into consideration and given prime importance while planning for the future.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes. The vision itself, "To excel in quality and to ensure equity in the field of higher education" states our policy on quality. Based on the broad parameters of our vision and mission, IQAC drafts the quality policy considering suggestions from management, college council and staff members. The final version approved by the college council iscommunicated to the stakeholders. The institution stands for academic excellence, skill development and character formation of all our students.

The institution has evolved a mechanism to generate, augment, maintain and monitor the quality through different programmes like,

- Formulating teaching planaccording to the academic calendar and ensuring the implementation maintaining work diary.
- Transparent internal evaluation.
- Timely result reviews and remedial actions.
- Efforts to sustain excellence in sports and extracurricular activities.
- Collection and analysis of feedback from stakeholders

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The institution has a perspective plan for development. The IQAC, the Academic committees and Planning board take up the responsibility of preparing the annual academic plan as well as long term action plan for the institution.



6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.



Our institution is a Government aided Arts and Science College owned and managed by Nair Service Society, a pioneer educational agency in Kerala. Appointment, promotion and transfer of staff are made centrally by the management and are approved by the University and Government. Government funding is the major source of income. Management and PTA also provide finance based on requirements. The academic matters are decided by the University.

The NSS executive council and Colleges' Central Committee instruct the Principal in coordinating the academic and administrative activities. Principal is given necessary guidelines by these bodies regarding the financial matters.

The College Council

The college has a statutory council headed by the Principal and represented by HODs, two elected representatives of teachers, superintendent of the administrative office and the librarian. The council meets at regular intervels to plan and review the functioning of the college. The college level programmes are organized by various cells and forums as per the

recommendations of the college council. The HODs undertake the responsibilities of departmental activities including admission, work allotment, curricular and co-curricular activities

Internal Quality Assurance Cell

IQAC ensures the excellence of the institution by the enhancement and sustenance of quality. Major activities of IQAC includes academic planning, monitoring and documentation of all events in the college, preparation of AQAR and organizing professional development programmes for faculty as well as non-teaching staff.

Faculty council

Faculty meetings are conducted to discuss academic matters and issues related to administration. The recommendations of faculty council are finalized in the college council.

PTA

Annual general body meeting of PTA elects the parent representatives of the executive committee. Budget for the academic year is prepared by considering the feedback from the parent community. PTA executive meets regularly and reviews issues related to academics, extracurricular activities, infrastructure and finance.

Alumni Association

The alumni serve as a link between the college and the society. The alumni offer timely support for enriching the academic and non academic activities of the institution

Student council

Student council consists of staff advisors and college union representatives. The critical interventions of student council help in addressing various issues pertaining in the college.

Administrative office

The office of the institution takes care of all the administrative matters pertaining to the faculty and the students.

College Committees

The college thrives on various statutory and non-statutory committees. The decision making process is decentralized through these committees subjected to the approval of college council and higher authorities.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching & Learning

Quality improvement in teaching and learning mainly depends on the introduction of new courses and the revision of scheme and syllabus by the University. The strategies of the institution for quality improvement are:

- Enrichment of teaching learning process using ICT enabled techniques
- Upgradation of college library by escalating its resources.
- Ensuring the availability and maintenance of sufficient systems and internet connectivity in the computer lab as well as all departments.
- Improvement of science laboratories by the addition of new equipments.
- Organising ASAP foundation course for skill development in specialized areas
- Implementation of WWS Walk With a Scholar programme sponsored by Department of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala.
- Motivational visit to reputed institutions by WWS mentees
- Implementation of SSP Student Support Programme by KSHEC.
- Implementation of UGC sponsored merged schemes, like Career Guidance and Counseling, Coaching for Entry in Service for SC/ST/OBC(non-creamy layer) and

Minorities, Remedial Coaching for SC/ST/OBC(non-creamy layer) and Minorities and Equal Opportunity Centre

 Mentoring, tutorial meetings and peer teaching to improve the performance of the students.

Research & Development

Institution promotes faculty members to take up research activities and helps in the procurement of research grants from agencies like UGC, KSCSTE etc. Institution supports faculty members in availing FDP of UGC. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in International/ National seminars/workshops on emerging research areas. The institution has signed MoU with four other institutions with a view to strengthen research activities. Students are encouraged to visit research institutions during study tours. The overhead amounts received from the research grants are fully utilized for the promotion of research activities in various departments.

Research cell in the college promotes and monitors the research activities of the institution. 23 out of 43 permanent teachers possess PhD degree and 6 of them are approved research guides. Chemistry Department is a recognized research centre of Kannur University since 2007. Physics department has set up a research lab for the implementation of a major project sanctioned by KSCSTE and has applied for recognition as research center. Physics and Chemistry Departments produced 5 and 1 Ph Ds respectively till date.

Community engagement

PRNSS College is one of the oldest institutions of higher learning in Kannur district. The institution is sincerely engaged in providing free and fair education to all without any discrimination. The college ensures the principle of equity and access to higher education for the students from SC, ST/OBC/Minor Communities as well as differently abled by following the rules of reservation. Of the total strength during 2015-16 of 1287 students, 114 belong to SC, 35-ST and 325-OBC. 90% of the students of our college reside in rural areas.

Community engagement is a priority area of our institution. The college has undertaken a number of projects on socially relevant issues and problems through different platforms like, NSS, NCC, Vanithavedi, Staff Club and Department Clubs. Some of our major contributions are,

- NSS constructed 4 houses for families identified with the help of local government bodies.
- NSS constructed and repaired roads in rural areas during their annual camps.
- NCC has taken up plastic eradication campaign in association with Mattannur municipality and conducts periodic blood donation camps.
- Vanithavedi, social service wing of our lady teachers conducted cervical cancer detection camp for the public and stitching classes to unemployed women in the adopted colony.
- Staff club provides financial support for medical attention to the ailing community approaching the institution for help.
- History Department has contributed in preparing a document on the history of Mattanur as per the request of Mattanur municipality.
- College Central Library in collaboration with Mattanur Municipal Library has launched interlibrary loan facility to improve the reading habits of students.
- Department clubs engages in community activities through their extension programmes.
- Computer center offers summer holiday crash courses for school students.

Human resource management

Many in-house HR programmes are arranged for the faculty and the students, which include motivational talks, soft skills training, ICT training, and stress management sessions. The new appointees, both teaching and non teaching are given orientation so as to equip them to adapt with the work culture of the institution. The value added programmes are often chalked out by organizations like N S S and N C C to develop life skills and community orientation. Some departments arrange career guidance to their students by utilizing the service of alumni. Various departments, NCC and NSS also organize personality development programmes to equip the students for employment.

Industry interaction

Students from the departments like English, Commerce and Chemistry are given opportunities to meet and interact with the practitioners at their own place or in the institution itself in order to bridge the gap between theory and practice and to give the students hands-on experience and exposure to industry/agency culture.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal takes special attention in ensuring that adequate information is communicated to the management and other stakeholders. The feedback collected from college council, staff council, student council, IQAC, various committee meetings, alumni meetings and PTA are summarized and reported to the management. The college report presented by the Principal on the annual day, which is later on printed and published through the college magazine, ensures the flow of information from the college to other stakeholders. The college website, college diary, college annual news letter, "Impressions", news papers and the printed prospectus issued with the admission application form also gives an insight of our institution to the public.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The college is under the management of **Nair Service Society** (N.S.S), a leading organization which renders its contribution to various service areas with several institutions of higher learning, like Arts and Science Colleges, Training Colleges, Engineering College, Polytechnics, High Schools, Higher Secondary Schools, Vocational Higher Secondary Schools, Hospitals and Paramedical institutions.

The management ensures that all the members of the staff understand and share the vision and mission of the college. The transparency of policies and sharing of responsibilities always helps to foster a sense of belongingamong all. Under the leadership of the management, Principal, HODs and staff members (both teaching and non-teaching), work as a team, sharing responsibilities which provide an excellent working atmosphere in the campus.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If yes, what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, the government with the approval of the University provides autonomy to the institutions. At present no efforts are made by the institution to obtain autonomy.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution has an inbuilt mechanism to respond to suggestions, complaints and grievances of students. The college interacts with its stakeholders formally and informally and measures are taken to solve the problems. The college follows an open door policy, which allows the stakeholders to communicate their grievances directly to the Principal or before the HODs, tutorial meetings and class PTA meetings. The other bodies exist in our college to address complaints and grievances are,

Internal assessment Grievance Redressal Mechanism

Under this, Internal Assessment Committee is constituted to look into complaints regarding continuous evaluation. Department level committee consists of the HOD, the teacher concerned and the department coordinator. The college level committee consists of the Principal, the HOD concerned and college coordinator.

Anti Ragging Squad and committee

An anti ragging squad is functioning in the college. In case of any complaint the students can contact the squad members through phone or in person. Complaints regarding ragging if any will be forwarded to Anti ragging committee for detailed investigation and recommendation of the action.

Women Anti Harassment Cell

Any complaint regarding atrocities against girl students can be reported to the cell in person or by phone. After interactions and discussions in the concerned committees, proper corrective measures and actions are taken.

Grievance Redressal cell

This cell intends to address the complaints regarding general matters.

Two complaint boxes are kept for those who hesitate to complaint in person before any committee. The names and phone numbers of various committees are displayed in a prominent place near college office.

6.2.10 Duringthe last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

Yes. NSS Management has decided to ban forthwith all political activities of the students in the campus. No student shall get involved in any political activity by him or abet the said activity to be carried on by fellow students inside the campus in any manner whatsoever and any such activity is hereby banned inside the campus.

Court Verdict (Effective from 27.01.16)

The judgment of WP(C) 3177/2016(V) strictly enforces the direction contained in 2016(1) KLT 180

- a) Any student on strike who disrupts the academic activity whether it be lecture, seminar, moot court or tutorials is liable to be removed by the police on complaint made by the head of the department or principal of the college. College authorities can also initiate disciplinary proceedings against the erring student.
- b) The members of the teaching faculty are empowered to take classes during strike/dharna even if there is only one student in the class room and such teaching hour is liable to be reckoned.
- c) No student has any sort of right to obstruct other eligible students from entering the class rooms or the portals of the college under the guise of strike, agitation or dharna.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes. The student feedback on institutional performance is taken every year. After analysis and discussions in appropriate bodies, the information is used in framing policies and is promptly implemented with the support of the management.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college provides a conducive environment for the development of professional competencies of the teaching and non teaching staff. Some of the mechanisms evolved in the process are as follows

- The newly recruited teachers are given orientation in teaching, mentoring and evaluation methods.
- The young faculties are given opportunity to attend 28 days Orientation and 21 day Refresher courses organized by the academic staff colleges of various universities.
- Young teachers are encouraged to attend FLAIR
- Every year a good number of teachers are encouraged to attend refresher courses for the upgradation of their skills and knowledge.
- Annual Staff Development Programmes are conducted by IQAC to facilitate the improvement of performance of teachers, viz., ICT enables teaching.
- Training programmes are conducted for the non-teaching staff to enhance their computer skills.
- UGC schemes and plans are made available to the staff in time to enhance their professional development.
- All the departments are supported to organize extension activities, seminars and workshops.
- The institution encourages its staff to attend seminars and workshops.
- The college ensures the participation of staff members in various committees and programmes which ensures that every staff member feels being part of the institution.
- In housing learning by teachers is promoted for motivation.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

In accordance with the vision of our institution, i.e., excel in quality and provide equity, we are committed to empower our staff members to take up the responsibilities. In this regard, IQAC formulated and apply the following strategies.

- Encourage faculty members to attend orientation and refresher programmes.
- Provide opportunity to interact with eminent resource persons by conducting seminars, workshops and talks.
- Motivate faculty to apply for research projects and helping them to prepare research proposals.
- Motivate faculty members to acquire higher educational degrees like Ph.D. and certificate programmes.
- Support faculty members to publish their research papers and other articles.
- Provide more opportunities to attend e-learning programmes.
- Purchase of books, journals and e-resources for the library to make the environment more conducive for advanced learning.
- Provide enough infrastructural facilities for the laboratories and Departments like equipments, computers, printers and internet facility.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The Performance Based Appraisal System as recommended by the UGC is considered for appraising the performance of teachers on multiple activities such as teaching, research, participation in seminars/conferences, organizational ability, willingness to undertake responsibilities, leadership quality and so on. The self-appraisal reports are submitted to the IQAC at the end of every academic year by the faculty.

IQAC also collect faculty feedback from students annually and are analyzed. The Principal reviews and communicate it to the faculty. The Principal points out the strength and weaknesses and encourage for further improvement.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

IQAC reviews the performance appraisal reports and promotional measures are suggested and communicated to the stakeholders. The Principal submits the consolidated report of performance appraisal of faculty members to the management and the manager decides upon the subsequent placement or promotion.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

We have several welfare measures for the teaching and non teaching staff.

- Advance salary for permanent staff and guest faculty in case of delay in disbursing salary by government.
- Hostel facilities for both men and women staff.

- Sanction of leave for short assignments abroad.
- Cooperative store arranges loan facility
 Nearly 75% of staff have availed the benefit during last four years

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The moral values and rich traditions that the management upholds is the key factorwhich attracts and retain eminent faculty. Since the college is under a corporate management, the new vacancies are advertised statewide through national dailies and recruitment is done strictly according the state government norms and regulations. The institution offers freedom for academic and professional development of the faculty and also recognizes his/her achievements and contributions.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college follows a well defined financial and infrastructural development policy. Since our college is under the corporate management of NSS, the annual planning and budgeting towards infrastructural development comes under the annual budget of NSS itself. The college development committee comprising of management representatives monitor the infrastructure development under the direct supervision of top management.

Other financial resources are mainly available from Government, UGC and PTA. The HODs submit their requirements and are prioritized by the concerned committees (purchase, library, UGC cell, PTA executive etc.) and then recommended and forwarded by the college council to the planning board for ratification. Budgets are prepared for Government, UGC and PTA accounts separately by the Principals office and forwarded to the office of the Deputy Director of Collegiate Education and the management respectively. Audited statements and utilization certificates are submitted to the concerned agencies by the Principals office in time

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal and External Audit

Internal audit is done by the competent chartered accountant of NSS headquarters. External auditing is done by Government agencies; Deputy director of Collegiate Education (DDCE) office, Kozhikode and Auditor General (AG) office, Thiruvananthapuram. Internal audit is done every year and audit by DDCE and AG's office are done on the retirement of a Principal or within two or three years whichever is the earliest. Since our college had retirement of Principals in 2013 and 2015, the accounts were audited by competent agencies very recently.

Major Audit Objections

The recent external audit reports show few minor irregularities with respect to the financial management of the institution.

Recommendations and Compliance

a) As per G.O. (Ms) 615/2013, M.Sc. Mathematics and B.Sc. Plant Science courses were sanctioned and it is proposed that guest salary should be paid by the management; even though such a G.O. is prevailing, salary was claimed and credited.

- b) Rupees 3500/- as DCB of December 2015 was not collected. Measures are to be taken so that the amount is to be collected back as early as possible.
- c) Undistributed caution deposit should be refunded to govt. account and the original receipt should be presented before the authorities.
- d) It is recommended that a grant register should be maintained for the purchase from UGC schemes.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement ofacademic and administrative activities of the previous four years and thereserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

Major sources of institutional receipts are salary paid to the faculty members and administrative staff by the Government, UGC grants, PTA fund and income from PD account. Deficit is managed by the advances obtained from the management.

IQAC was formally constituted in 2009 before the first accreditation. Based on SWOC analysis, a strategic plan is formulated focusing mainly on institutional strengthening, improvement in employability and learning outcomes. This strategic plan forms the integrated framework for quality assurance.

CRITERION VII

INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1. Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The institution conducted Green Audit at three levels; energy audit, water audit and biodiversity audit with the support of staff and student community of the college.

1. Energy Audit

Energy audit revealed the energy consumption pattern of the college. Scattered buildings, very old electrical wiring and accessories usually made a hike in our electricity bills. An expert from Kerala State Electricity Board helped us to chalk out the reasons and remedies. The institution took constructive steps to change the electrification, switch boards, panel boards, lights and fans. A positive result of the energy audit is that the students are now aware of the need to conserve energy and that they voluntarily minimize the use of energy-gobbling equipment and promptly switch off fans, lights and other power equipments when not required and so the consumption level has come down.

2. Water Audit

Students collected data on the water supply system of the campus like length of water pipes, length of damaged pipes, damaged taps, water consumption rate of campus and hostellers. Measures were taken to repair the damaged pipes and taps and a committee consisting of staff and students monitor the effective and judicious usage of water.

3. Biodiversity Audit

Fauna and Flora of the campus was studied initially by the students of the Department of Zoology in 2010, with the support of Kerala State Biodiversity Board under a project to create a biodiversity register of the campus. Later on with the introduction of B.Sc. Plant Science course, the students of both Zoology and Botany Departments periodically renew the biodiversity register and are vigilant on any change in the composition.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly? The institution has taken a number of initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly.

1. Eco-friendly Campus

- Our college is situated on the edge of a laterite hill, one kilometer away from Mattanur, a small town in the eastern part of Kannur District and 25 kilometres away from "Aralam Wildlife Sanctuary", Kerala's northern most wildlife protected area.
- The campus with an area of 16.5 acres is a part of 105.5 acres with cashew and teak plantation owned by the management. A perennial stream originated from the southern slopes and vegetation is greatly represented by shrubs, herbs and climbers when compared with large trees.
- Department of Zoology maintains a 'Butterfly Garden' in the campus.
- Except one, all other buildings in the campus are single storied and have long verandas and windows to ensure free flow of air to classrooms. In 2014-15, the asbestos roofing of old buildings was replaced by GI sheets due to environmental concerns
- The campus follows a very systematic waste collection and segregation process. The plastic waste collected is periodically removed from the campus by the authorities of Mattanur Municipality.
- There is a vermin compost unit in the campus and pipe composts near every block to process the organic waste.

2. Energy Conservation and the Use of Renewable Energy

In order to conserve energy, the college has replaced some of the incandescent lights with LED lights. Planning board has earmarked Rs 5 lakhs for the proposed solar power plant under UGC twelth plan.

3. Water Harvesting

Rain water is being collected in the inbuilt catchment area of the campus so as to recharge the ground water. Besides we have two rainwater harvesting tanks of 1 lakh litre capacity each for the general purposes of the campus and a separate tank in the ladies hostel.

4. Construction of Check Dams on the Campus

Since our campus is located on a laterite hill, the buildings of the college were constructed by laterite blocks dig out from the area itself. The abandoned pits itself act as natural water reservoirs though there are no check dams constructed in the campus.

5. Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

Our sincere efforts for carbon neutrality include:

- Planting trees by NCC and NSS volunteers
- Carpooling and dependence on public transport by staff and students
- Segregation of degradable and non degradable waste in the campus and disposal in ecofriendly manner
- Collection, and segregation of plastic waste with the help of students and handing over them to external agency for recycling.

6. Plantation

- Rich plant diversity of our campus is supplemented by the surrounding cashew and teak plantations.
- NSS, NCC, and Nature Club plant and maintain tree saplings every year with the support of Social Forestry Department of the Government.
- Department of Botany maintains a 'Medicinal Plant Garden' and 'Mango Germplasm' in the campus.

7. Hazardous Waste Management

We take extreme care in managing the hazardous wastes like chemicals and acids from the laboratories. They are properly collected and disposed in an eco friendly manner. Department of Chemistry takes initiatives to shift from conventional practices to micro scale analysis.

8. E-waste Management

E-wastes are stored in secured place with a view to reuse some of its working parts. The equipments which cannot be reused are sold to recycling agencies after official procedures.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

We have introduced a number of innovative schemes and programmes under the coordination and facilitation of the IQAC of the college. A few of the major innovations implemented during the past five years are given below. They are mentioned in detail in the respective criterion.

- Inter Library Loan Service provide access to libraries outside the campus
- Little Library to improve reading habits

- ASAP skill development programmes
- Rain water harvesting to tackle water scarcity during summer

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1. Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Best Practice I

1. Title of the Practice

Inculcating Learner Enthusiasm and Awareness of Democracy – i LEAD

2. Goal

As young citizens of our country the students have to be weaned towards loftier democratic concepts, detailed processes and mature practices which would enable them to accept and reciprocate the various themes associated with democracy like free and fearless articulation of ideas, tolerance towards opposition, synthesis of ideas and opinions, consensus building and sensitivity to secular values. There is also the need to acquaint the students with various processes like elections, representation, committee habits, organizing agenda based discussions and maintaining protocols. The students also need to be trained in organizing meetings, functions, competitions and cultural programs. These are the goals of the best practice conceived under the present title.

3. The Context

Our college had a reputation for student unrest during certain specific phases in the past. We used to have agitations, factional clashes and such issues which needed to be addressed not only from a law and order point of view but from the point of view of democratic settlements of disputes and disagreements. Resorting to inclusive democratic practices by giving maximum initiative, leadership opportunities and decision taking and implementing chances to the students was the institutional safeguard developed by the college to overcome this difficulty. The run up to the college union elections often led to factional feuds which had to be toned down by ushering in the spirit of collective decision making and implementations. The representation of girls in the college union had never tallied with their numerical strength in the college. However by introducing parliamentary system instead of the presidential system that had prevailed earlier that disparity was also addressed.

4. The Practice

Fostering the concepts, practices and processes of democracy was achieved through a comprehensive student centered approach where the students were not only allowed to organize activities under the auspices of the college union but also encouraged to come up with opinions and suggestions regarding the general conduct and administration of the college through Students' Affairs Committees. Such committees have representatives of the student organizations and other student forums and have become an avenue for the students to participate in the administrative and academic decision making process in the college. The

College Union elections are conducted in the parliamentary mode where each class elects two representatives of whom one has to be a girl student. Opportunities are provided for healthy and democratic campaigns complying with the University rules and regulations governing elections. Thereafter the elected class representatives join together to elect the major office bearers of the college union. The activities of the College Union are designed and implemented in such a way so that the students are given a lot of space in the decision making and implementing process. They are encouraged to come up with their own ideas and opinions which are then discussed by the College Union. All activities of the Union are carried out through a highly democratic and decentralized mode. Various committees comprising of students are set up for carrying out the activities of the Union. The celebration of anniversaries and other days of national importance are also organized by committees comprising of students and the office bearers of the college union. Care is taken to ensure that teacher interference in such activities is reduced to advisory and guiding functions. Every year the college organizes an elaborate and detailed arts festival under the name "Swaralaya" for selecting students to partake in University level arts competitions. These competitions are scheduled and organized by the Union by drawing volunteers from the students themselves. 'Arangu'-The College Arts Forum is also an ensemble of teachers and students in which utmost care is shown by the teachers to ensure that students are given initiative in each aspect of its activity. Various clubs and forums like the film club, the book club, tourism club, and activities like literary events, sporting events, talks, debates, symposia etc. are also organized under the leadership of the students. The college has taken conscious efforts to dismantle teacher dictated or teacher centered programs and supplant them with student centered programs and activities in each sphere of academic and extra-curricular activity.

5. Evidence of Success

With the introduction of democratic practices and processes student unrest has scaled down to minimal levels. Student involvements in various kinds of activities have gone up and incidents of factional clashes have also come down to a great extent. The College Union and other clubs and forums have now evolved into robust and active bodies which are autonomously managed by the students under the advisory and guiding presence of teachers assigned for the purpose. Exposure to democratic methods of settling disputes through mediations, consultations, collaborative endeavors, evolving consensus and compromises have contributed to the improvement of the general atmosphere prevailing in the college. The relationship between the teaching staff, the administrative staff and the students have become more cordial as well as goal oriented in recent times with the students resorting to legitimate forums to prefer their complaints, grievances and suggestions. The age old schism prevailing between the staff as the ruling power and the students as the ones being ruled over has been overcome to a certain extend. Various competitions within the college are conducted by dividing the student body into four Houses and these House activities are fully scheduled, controlled and regulated by the elected representatives of the students.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Numerous problems have been encountered along the way while carrying out this practice. Allowing students to voice their demands has always resulted in an escalation of demands, all of which cannot be met with the limited financial resources available in the college. Elections and other such democratic practices have by themselves sometimes given rise to a fresh volley of animosities. The systems of administration prevailing in the institution and the mindset of teachers have not been fully attuned to holistic democratic practices and processes. Sustained democratic practice and student centered decision making processes require a lot of energy, skill and flexibility which is not always willingly contributed by those in power. Numerous committees and sub-committees have to be formed along the way for detailed consultations and consensus building which sometimes becomes unwieldy and

impractical considering the heavy day to day administrative functions that have to be transacted in a time bound manner.

Best Practice II

1. Title of the Practice

Initiative for Service, Extension, Reformation and Volunteering in Education i SERVE

2. Goal

Learning process has to be seamlessly merged with various kinds of service and extension activities both for placing education on firm social grounds and also for inculcating a sense of volunteerism among the students. Often the under graduate curricula and syllabi do not go hand in hand with the immediate social reality from which the student community is drawn. Under such conditions education stands the danger of becoming an esoteric practice leading to learner passivity. Therefore the college has come up with various kinds of activities which would reinforce formal curricular transactions with service, extension and volunteering activities to make the learning process active, inclusive and socially oriented.

3. The Context

The students often fail to emotionally involve themselves with the learning process because they fail to see any immediate social relevance to what they are being taught in the classrooms. This has often led to student apathy. In the realm of higher education such direct social ties are not always present. Therefore the college felt the need to orient the students towards voluntary activity aimed at social service and renovation. Curriculum also lacked specific society oriented modules which would have given the students an opportunity to socialize with the communities around the college. Such activities reinforced the knowledge seeking, knowledge disseminating and knowledge applying aspects of higher education thereby giving the students a complete opportunity for personality development. Lack of interest in social problems and public themes was another problem that needed to be addressed by introducing various kinds of activities in which the students could involve themselves by their own free will.

4. The Practice

The deficiencies of the curriculum, especially in those areas which calls for extension activities and services, is experienced in the form of a general student apathy towards academic matters. Such apathy affects classroom participation, seminars, assignments and even examinations. Even before the introduction of this practice organizations like NSS and NCC in the college were carrying out the responsibility of promoting the spirit of social service and volunteerism. After detailed discussions in the advisory committees of NSS and among the volunteers themselves innovative practices like adoption of villages, building homes or helping to build homes for less privileged classmates, blood donation forums and conducting socio-economic surveys were added to the already existing itinerary of NSS and

NCC. Thus the voluntary activities which had been the practice of these organizations were given a new direction towards the fulfillment of social needs and thereby instilled with an immediate social commitment. Once this practice began showing results a module consisting of voluntary service was appended to the activities of the various other clubs, forums and associations which were active in the college. These voluntary modules were incorporated after holding consultations with the students who were involved in various clubs and forums. Planting trees, cleaning public places, programs for plastic waste management, conducting socio economic surveys to realize the needs of the people around the college, visit to old age homes, conducting SWAP shops, medical camps and disease detection programs and energy conservation programs were some of the voluntary tasks taken up by the students and teachers belonging to different clubs. Subject centered exhibitions were conducted by various departments which catered to the school students around the locality and were aimed to instill an enthusiasm for higher learning. Awareness classes about various subjects were also arranged as a part of this program. Tutorial meetings and other such forums were used in this process, not only to create awareness about the practice, but also to chalk out action plans with the participation of the students. All the activities of the College Students' Union, which requires a lot of manpower, were successfully carried out with the help of willing volunteers. In the coming years we wish to augment the practice by identifying the specific social service module or activity that is related to the particular curriculum that a student has to follow.

5. Evidence of Success

The first sign of success was the enthusiastic response received from the students. Activities like building houses for underprivileged classmates saw massive and keen participation. Such activities needed a lot of labor, materials and money. All these were made available through voluntary work and charity. The project, which was rather heavy, went on to become a huge success under the supervision of the NSS Programme Officer and the volunteers. Instead of viewing it as an activity of NSS the whole college joined together to make the endeavor a huge success. Once the program succeeded conscious efforts were taken to disseminate the enthusiasm thus generated to other clubs and forums and results began to surface. The College Union, clubs and other forums were able to chart out service oriented activities and they proved to be a huge success with the massive participation of the students.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Scheduling such activities was a major problem in itself. The curricular schedule was already hectic and the students had to miss out on at least some of their classes to participate in such activities. Raising funds for come activities was the next problem encountered. Providing funds to match student enthusiasm was not always an easy task. Lack of skilled hands among the students was the next problem-because that required the use of supplementary labor, often at a high cost. Maintaining the incentive level in voluntary work by assigning duties and tasks to the students and involving them wholeheartedly in all the activities was also a problem which required careful teacher supervision.

- The department tries to develop the spirit of scientific enquiry as well as responsible citizenship in students. Through diverse mechanisms we extend our resources for the benefit of the society. Regular blood donation and blood group detection programmes are conducted by the department in collaboration with various agencies. We keep a blood donors' directory and information is made available to the needy. Such activities are found to be positively influential among students and community.
- Annual departmental study trips to areas of ecological importance aim at developing naturalistic as well as aesthetic qualities in students. With the motto of sustainability and conservation, we maintain a vermin compost tank and a garden. A butterfly garden is also set in the campus.
- The Department prepared a campus biodiversity register with the support of Kerala State Biodiversity Board in 2010-11 and is updating the data every year with the support of our students.
- Our extension activities are focused on dissemination and application of knowledge at different strata of society. Students interacted with school children on conservation of biodiversity and took classes for them. Hand on training in apiculture and vermin culture was given to the students and parents. An extensive programme on conservation of energy was done by the department in three legislative constituencies in Kannur. Planned at three tiers of activity- energy audit, awareness on conservation and feedback- the programme helped us to extend our scientific knowledge for the benefit of society as well as training for students in responsible citizenship.

- Vocational courses such as Apiculture, Sericulture and Aquaculture etc. can be introduced as short-term certificate courses.
- Offer professional and technological assistance in doing projects by students of other institutions or agencies.
- Department can take up independent projects like impact assessment studies etc.with external funding.
- Act as a medium to disseminate the theoretical as well as practical aspects of the subject in association with governmental and non-governmental agencies.
- So as to make the basic science course more effective, new courses which cater to the requirements of the changing global scenario can be designed and offered by the Department.

CHALLENGES

- Professional and vocational courses which attract students due to their higher rate of employability.
- Being stuck to the traditional courses and patterns, lack of academic freedom etc., reduces the chances of exploring the new frontiers of the subject. Inability to readily update according to the changing demands of the society.
- Interdisciplinary approach is not properly adopted due to various constraints. This may prove detrimental in future.
- Shortage in financial aids and funding may hinder the progress of the Department.

36. SWOC analysis

The Physical Education Department has established in the year 1965. The department offers an open course in physical education in the V semester. The name of the course is 'Health and Fitness Education'. University has constituted board of studies comprising physical education faculties to prepare syllabus and to conduct examination in the pen course.

STRENGTH:

- We have a volleyball sports hostel aided by Kerala State Sports Council.
- We have produced many universities, state, national and international level volleyball players including former Indian volleyball Captain Joby Joseph.
- Every year many players are getting placement under sports quota in defence service as well as in other Govt. Sectors.
- We have a good cricket team. A vast majority of the college students are interested to play cricket.
- We also have very good football, softball, badminton and Kho-Kho team.
- All these teams are showing remarkable achievements in the University intercollegiate tournaments.
- Mover over our volleyball team has secured many championships in local tournaments also.
- The shuttle badminton team practice in an indoor court after travelling 15 KM away from the institution. Within the limited facilities our college is fielding players in fourteen events in the university intercollegiate level tournaments.

WEAKNESS:

- Even though we have good volleyball team, we do not have a standard volleyball court.
- We use to practice cricket, football, softball, handball and athletics in one ground. The present size of the play field is 85x45.
- The shuttle badminton team practice in an indoor court after travelling 15 KM away from the institution.
- We do not have indoor facility to practice those games.
- We do not have physical conditioning facility with adequate equipment.

OPPORTUNITY:

- If we overcome the above weakness by providing good sports facilities like indoor stadium, cricket nets & concrete pitch, modifying the present playfield to a 400 mts track, etc..the college can build up good teams in almost all games including athletics.
- Our college has got a huge list of sports persons placed under sports quota in defense and various government departments. A part from this the main focus of physical education department is, the health related physical fitness of college students.

CHALLENGES

- Lack of sports facilities unable to attract players in our institution.
- Many of the outstanding sports persons are migrating to neighboring state for improving their sports career.
- The incentives to the sports students are very meagre and fund allotment is very limited especially for the purchase of sports equipment and to meet daily allowance of athletes. At present only one seat is reserved under sports for PG course. This should be increased to give opportunity to the talented athletes.

FUTURE PLANS:

- Construction of standard volleyball court
- Construction of a cricket pitch (concrete) with nets
- Expansion of college play ground with a 400 mts track with 8 lanes
- Construction of an indoor with multiple sports equipment
- Construction of a pavilion attached to the play field.


